During one memorable at-bat the spring of my son's first baseball season, he repeatedly hit the tee instead of the ball. And it was obvious what the problem was. In a way, I'm touched that my son wants me to take pleasure in his success. But I'm also awestruck by my responsibility as a father. A father's love means almost everything to a child. It establishes his or her identity. It brings peace, security, and joy.

If a father's affection matters so much, then it had better be the kind of affection that is just as strong after a strikeout as it is after a grand slam.

A SUCCESSFUL marriage requires falling in love many times—but always with the same person! Husbands are to be understanding and affectionate. Wives are to be helpful and responsive to every reasonable request of their husbands. Marriage is a two-way street of consideration and cooperation. The Bible emphasizes that it should be a blessed and lasting bond—not a trial balloon! A husband who forgets to show love because he's busy as a bee may one day find his honey gone. Wives must remember that marriage is more than finding the right person, it's primarily a matter of being the right person. Each partner should keep from putting selfish notes into the tune of marital harmony. They both must be willing to endure a little heat of disagreement unless they want a half-baked relationship.

In a book entitled *Homemaking*, J. R. Miller gives some excellent advice to husbands and wives. He says, "There are no hearts that hunger so for expression of affection as the ones of which we are most sure. There is no love that so needs its daily bread as the love that is strongest and holiest. There is no place where rudeness or a crabby attitude is so unpardonable as inside our own doors and toward our beloved husband or wife. The more tender and true the relationship, the more it craves the thousands of little attentions and kindnesses which so reassure and satisfy the heart."

Husbands and wives, remember, love can stand anything but neglect. Indeed, the bonds of matrimony aren't worth much unless the interest is kept up!

Married only a few months, he was proudly proclaiming the fact that he was entitled to claim a \$600 deduction for his wife. I scanned his return and everything seemed to be in order until I came to the section reserved for listing dependents. There he had written in large bold letters 'Keep Watching This Space.'"

Paul Tournier, in his book To Understand Each Other, gives the progression that leads to difficulty in marriage. "They speak of three different phases. The first is the honeymoon phase. The couple feel that they understand each other both easily and amazingly well. You can hear the fiancee saying, 'My fiance has the same taste in everything, we're the very same. We agree in all matters and we are able to talk everything over between us. Even before I begin to say something he has already thought the same. He senses all my wishes and all my feelings he understands' During the early years of marriage, we are still in the honeymoon stage, still have the sense of spontaneous, mutual understanding and complete sameness. By instinct, we choose partners complementary to ourselves. What each one has repressed in himself during the period of adolescent differentiation, he rediscovers in his partner. Hence, the wonderful feeling of completeness in each other. Then comes the second phase in marriage usually found between the fifth and tenth years of marriage according to the same specialists. In this stage each one realizes that the other is not so similar to himself as he had thought. He discovers faults he had heretofore unnoticed. Whereas faults which he was sure would disappear quickly under the happy effects of marriage --now these faults are often of the most insupportable and tenacious kind. They include temper, selfishness, lying, greed, violence, vulgarity, drunkenness. What a let down! We begin dently by warning the other, then by scolding, by imploring, and finally by threatening. Yet, none of these takes effect. Then comes the well-known expression, 'I can't understand him.' Then comes the temptation to withdraw into onesself in order to lesson the risk of conflict, the temptation to abdicate. This is the beginning of the third phase, It will develop according to the direction which the previous phase has taken. It may be the progressive giving up and the struggle for happiness, resentment, bitterness, rebellion, 'My husband is not the man I believed he was,' 'My wifeis not at all what I thought her to be,' 'I made a terrible mistake.' At this point they begin to think of divorce. Let us react then against the stupid idea of chance which leads men to imagine that we may hit upon a pearl for a wife as one might a prize in a lottery. Besides, it could be very difficult to be married to a pearl if you did not feel yourself in the same category. What really counts then is the working out together of marital happiness. It is a goal to strive after, not a privilege gained at the outset, and to work it out, the ability to understand each other is essential. So called 'emotional incompatibility' is a myth invented by jurists short of arguments in order to pleade for divorce."

Peter, in the opening statement of this third chapter, uses the phrase "in like manner" referring back to 2:18, "Servants be submissive to your masters." Now, in like manner wives be putting yourselves into subjection to your own husbands. Whereas there is God's chain of command with regard to government and our submission to the authorities over us in this area, there is also God's chain of commandin regards to employer-employee relationship. So the same chain of command comes down to the home and the Scriptures teach the headship of the husband in this relationship.

She must be pure, there must be in her life a lovely chastity, and a fidelity which is founded on love. She must be reverent, she must live in the condition that the whole world is the temple of God, and all life is lived in the presence of Christ. The wife who became a Christian would have neither her troubles nor her sorrows to seek, her only weapon must be the silent preaching of a lovely life."

The extent of submission on the part of the wife has been illustrated by the model that

we've looked at back in chapter 2 in the person of Jesus Christ.

Stedman, in commenting on the statement, "without a word" on the part of the wife says, "Without a word does not mean she is never to speak to him. It simply means she is not to bag him. It is clearly bagging that is in view here. I heard of a man who called his wife Peg although she really had another name. Someone asked him why he did this and he said, 'Well, Peg is short for Pegases, and Pegases was an immortal horse, and an immortal horse is an everlasting nag. That's why I call my wife Peg,"

Verse Two: Having observed your pure manner of life with a reverential fear.

Peter is telling us here that the disbelieving husband is won without a word by observing the pure manner of life with a reverential fear.

Peter has already spoken of our manner of life in chapter 2, verse 12 where he says, "Having your manner of life among the gentiles beautiful in its goodness in order that in case they are speaking against you as those who are doing evil as a result of your good deeds which they are watching, they may glorify God on the day of visitation.

Whereas in chapter 2 Peter is talking about our witness to the unsaved in general, now in chapter 3 he is making it more specific of a Christian wife to an unsaved husband. Verse three: Let your adornment not be the outward adorning with braiding the hair and wearing of gold amaments or putting on clothing

Here Peter is not speaking against the matter of outward adorning, but the comparative value of the two. The most important is the hidden person of the heart which we will see in verse 4.

This verse is just pointing up the negative side of the admonition, and in verse 4 we will get the positive.

There are three things which the woman can spend a lot of time and money on which is really not top priority if a choice had to be made. These three things are the braiding of the hair the wearing of gold ornaments, and butting on of clothing. Have, Jewelry Clothes Peter is not saying it is wrong to braid the hair, or to wear jewelry or to put on nice clothing, but that those are only material things and the most important matter is seen in verse 4 wrong to wear Clothes.

Verse Four: But let it be the hidden person of the heart with the imperishable quality of genrie and guiet spirit, which is in the sight of God very costly.

"But" forms the contrast, and now we get the positive statement. Whereas it is not to be the outward adorning, it is to be the hidden person of the heart which is to be adomed because this is true beauty.

This adornment of the heart is to be with the imperishable qualities of a gentle and quiet spirit.

Peter mentions the gentle and quiet spirit which likewise are characteristics of the Lord Jesus himself, described in the latter part of chapter 2. Verse 23, "When he was being reviled, he was not reviling in return, and who while suffering was not threatening, but

Peter tells us further that this imperishable quality of a gentle and quiet spirit is in the sight of God very costly. Back in chapter 2, verse 20, we read, "If when you are doing good and suffering for it and this you are enduring this is commendable in the sight of God." Peter is telling us that the wife's responsibility in marriage is to cultivate the hidden person of the heart, manifesting a gentle and quiet spirit rather than being overly concerned about the Teaching Resources by Don Angerson virusures. The cources, all of which have been appropriately credited to outward adornment because it is this inner quality of life produced by the Spirit of God that is going to make it possible for an unbelieving husband to be won to the Savior. Verse Five: For thus formerly also the holy women, the ones who hoped in God, used to edoug themselves, putting themselves in subjection to their own husbands. In this fifth verse, Peter gives a reason for the previous admonition by using an illustration from the women of the Old Testament. There are three things said about these women in this fifth verse: First of all, they were holy women who hoped in God. Secondly, they adorned themselves with the inner adorning of the hidden person with a gentle and quiet spirit. Thirdly, they were putting themselves into subjection to their own Verse Six: As Sarah used to obey Abrham, calling him lord whose children you became if you are doing good and not fearing any terror. Now Peter makes the illustration more specific by citing Sarah as one who used to obey Abraham, in other words put herself into subjection of his leadership, calling him lord. Then, he applies it to the New Testament, "whose children you became if" in a positive way "you are doing good" and in a negative way "you are not fearing any terror". What Peter is saying is that these two manifestations of doing good and not fearing terror are just manifestations of the fact that you've been born again by the living word of God. the best of our ability If this is the case, your life will bear fruit to this end and you will not be fearing any terror because God's judgment for your sin has already been poured on the person of Jesus Christ, Verse Seven: Husbands, in like manner, be living with your wives according to knowledge showing honor unto the woman as the weaker vessel (sex) as to those who are also joint-heirs of the grace of life in order that your prayers may not be hindered. Peter now turns to the husband's responsibility in marriage in this seventh verse. And there Quotations are two things he wants to say to the husbands: First, be living with your wives according to knowledge and secondly, showing honor unto the woman as the weaker vessel as to those who are also joint-heirs of the grace of life. The purpose behind these admonitions is seen in the last phrase of the verse, "in order that your prayers may not be hindered." First of all, Peter in his admonition to husbands says "Be living with your wives according knowledge". That is quite a command, to say the least, who has ever been able to understand a woman? Seriously, Peter is admonishing the husbands to be living with thier wives according to the knowledge that the woman's needs are different from his own. Time must be taken to be considerate, to communicate, to be concerned and to be careful to be sensitive to the needs of his wife. This then would be fulfilling the admonition to be living with your wives according to knowledge. The second thing that Peter says here is "showing honor unto the woman as the weaker vessel or sex as to those who are also joint heirs of the grace of life". Both the husband and the wife are the vessels in the household of God. One is stronger than the other, but both belong to Him. A Woman feels loved when she is understood ... Here in this passage, Peter makes it clear that the husbands and wives who know him are joint-heirs of the grace of life. - Smith points out, "They will be reunited hereafter, the closest bands we form on earth are severed by the hand of death, and the day will come when your wife will be taken from you or you from her, and one of you will sit by the corpse of the other and think perhaps of the history of your married life. Even then religion will be your solace and your stay. How different the emotions of the believer when called to part with one he truely loves from those of a sceptic or an infidel. He knows that the separation will be brief and that fellow heirs of life, he and his loved one will meet again in the realms of immortality and bliss. In heaven they neither marry nor are given in marriage but are as the angels of God, yet from the apostles language here we should certainly infer the recognition of our friends in heaven, and even a reunion with them in bonds not to be severed again. Honor then your wife, she will one day like yourself, be as an angel of God. You will tread together the bowers of paradise, you will drink together the water of life, you will chant together the song of victory, you will dwell together in the unclouded presence of your Lord."

Stedman, in commenting on this phrase "you are joint-heirs of the grace of life" said: "This means that a husband must recognize his wife's right to share every part of his thinking, of his whole life. All the barriers must come down between them, all the channels of communication must be open. There are no off-limit areas that he keeps separate from his wife. This does not mean that they must always participate in everything mutually, but it does mean that there must be mutual understanding in this area. There is to be no threat of rivalry to his love for her from some outside activity or occupation. This relates again to that central need fo woman to have first place in her husband's affections. He must share so fully his needs, his desires and his reactions with her that she understands the whole situation and feels no threat arising from it. He must understand that women are made to be helpmeets, partners. What good is a partner if she is excluded from some particular area? Her urge to share his life fully accounts for woman's notorious curiosity. She cannot tolerate exclusion from any area of her husband's life. Her attempts to satisfy this basic drive accounts for what some husbands call 'nosey' wives, but there is nothing wrong with her. It is his fault, not hers. He is to open these doors of channel and communication to her."

The purpose now given by Peter for these previous admonitions is in order that your prayers may not be hindered.

Barclay, in speaking on this purpose, says: "Finally, unless a man realizes and fulfills these obligations, there is a barrier between his prayers and God. As Bigg puts it, The signs of the injured wife come between the husbands prayers and God's hearing.

CONCLUSION: Peter in Pattern Number Six, "When One Plus One Equals One" has shared with us the responsibility of the wives and the responsibility of the husbands. As these responsibilities are fulfilled on the part of each of the partners involved in the marriage then we get the mathematical equation, 1 + 1 = 1.

Paul, in writing to the Ephesians in chapter 5 speaks of the husband and wife relationship.

"You wives must learn to adapt yourselves to your husbands, as you submit yourselves to the Lord, for the husband is the head of the wife in the same way that Christ is the head of the church, the Savior of the body. The willing subjection of the church to Christ should be reproduced in submission of wives to their husbands. But remember this means that the husband must give his wife the same sort of love that Christ gave to the church when He sacrificed himself for her. Fear not to give their wives the love they naturally have for their own bodies, the love a man gives his wife is the extending of his love for himself, to enfold her. In practice, what I have said amounts to this, let everyone of you who is a husband, love his wife as he loves himself and let the wife reverence her husband."
