Are You Plugged In?

INTRODUCTION:

(Splashes of Joy in the Cesspools of Life by Barbara Johnson)

The other day I ran across an old recording by the late Victor Buono, which included the following prayer by the tortured dieter:

Lord, my soul is ripped with riot,

Incited by my wicked diet.

"We are what we eat," said a wise old man.

Lord, if that's true, I'm a garbage can.

I want to rise on Judgment Day, that's plain,

But at my present weight I'll need a crane.

So grant me strength that I may not fall

Into the clutches of cholesterol.

May my flesh with carrot curls be sated.

That my soul may be polyunsaturated.

And show me the light that I may bear witness

To the President's Council on Physical Fitness.

And oleo margarine I'll never mutter

For the road to hell is spread with butter.

And cream is cursed, and cake is awful,

The Chicago Tribune of April 30, 1967, devoted a section to "The Phenomenon of Nature, Tornados." It reported:

They are the most destructive winds that sweep across the earth. Winds in the funnel have been reportedly estimated at 300-500 miles an hour. Tornados with their enormous power have lifted trains from tracks, doubled brick and steel structures and driven straw several inches into trees. They have lifted a house and set it down on another.

Christians can learn a real lesson from this. A straw under any other conditions can never be driven into a tree because it is much weaker than the tree. However, if it is engulfed and completely controlled by the tornado, the power of the tornado becomes that of the straw. The same is true of the believer when he has yielded to the Holy Spirit.

2 Timothy 1:7

For God has not given us a spirit of timidity, but of power and love and discipline.

2 Samuel 22:33

It is God who arms me with strength and makes my way perfect.

Acts 4:31

And when they had prayed, the place where they had gathered together was shaken, and they were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak the word of God with boldness.

Zechariah 4:6

So he said to me, "This is the word of the Lord to Zerubbabel: 'Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit,' says the Lord Almighty.

Acts 1:8

but you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and even to the remotest part of the earth.

Matthew 28:18

And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to Me in heaven and on earth.

The power is certainly available to us. It is just a question as to whether or not we are plugged into that power.

Perhaps you are a Christian and plugged into that power, but you have grieved the Holy Spirit by sin or quenched the Holy Spirit by failure to submit to His plan, and that has thrown the switch.

Hendricksen says:

In this passage the author points to the source of power for the believer. It is as if he wished to say, "In your strength you cannot fulfill the precepts which I have just issued."

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v.23 Now may the God of peace Himself sanctify you entirely (through and through); and may your spirit and soul and body be preserved complete, without blame at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The apostle Paul is going to PRAYER again, even as we were with him in prayer in chapters 1 and 3.

He began the letter with prayer:

1 Thessalonians 1:2, 3

We are always giving thanks to God for all of you, making mention of you in our prayers; constantly bearing in mind your work of faith and your labor of love and your perseverance of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, in the presence of our God and Father;

In the middle of the letter he stops for prayer:

1 Thessalonians 3:11-13

Now may our God and Father Himself and our Lord Jesus direct our way to you; and may the Lord cause you to increase and abound in love for one another, and for all men, just as we also do for you; so that He may establish your hearts blameless in holiness in the presence of our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all His saints.

He now concludes the letter with a prayer.

We will note here in this passage that he prays for 2 THINGS:

- 1."MAY THE GOD OF PEACE HIMSELF SANCTIFY YOU ENTIRELY (THROUGH AND THROUGH),"
- 2."MAY YOUR SPIRIT AND SOUL AND BODY BE PRESERVED COMPLETE, WITHOUT BLAME AT THE COMING OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST."

"NOW MAY THE GOD OF PEACE HIMSELF SANCTIFY YOU ENTIRELY (THROUGH AND THROUGH)."

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

To encourage his readers Paul highlighted God's ability to produce peace. This is true in the gospel, it is true in relationship with each other, and His peace is an adequate resource for the future.

Ellicott says:

He on whom all depends, in contrast to them and the efforts they might be unable to make, the God of whom peace is a characterizing attribute.

Hogg and Vine say:

It was probably suggested to the apostle's mind in contrast with the disorders against which he had just warned them. Other titles of God similarly constructed are "the God of glory," "the God of patience," "the God of hope," "the God of all comfort," "the God of love," "the God of all grace." That is to say, God is the source of all these blessings.

Lange, in his commentary, says:

Without peace no sanctification [God is first the God of peace, before He be the God of sanctification.], without sanctification, there is no peace.
p. 101

Colossians 1:20

and through Him to reconcile all things to Himself, having made peace through the blood of His cross; through Him, I say, whether things on earth or things in heaven.

Romans 5:1

Therefore having been justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ,

Isaiah 32:17

The fruit of righteousness will be peace; the effect of righteousness will be quietness and confidence forever.

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Isaiah 26:3

You will keep in perfect peace him whose mind is steadfast, because he trusts in you.

Philippians 4:6, 7

Be anxious for nothing, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which surpasses all comprehension, shall guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.

Romans 16:20

And the God of peace will soon crush Satan under you feet. The grace of our Lord Jesus be with you.

Isaiah 57:20, 21

But the wicked are like the tossing sea, which cannot rest, whose waves cast up mire and mud. "There is no peace," says my God, "for the wicked."

(Beyond the Mirror: Reflections on Death and Life by Henri J. M. Nouwen)

I was surprised by my reaction. At so many moments in the past, I had experienced immense interior anguish and turmoil. I had lived through agonizing feelings of rejection and abandonment, and had known paralyzing fear and panic--often triggered by small matters. I had been afraid of people and unknown forces. I knew myself as a very tense, nervous, and anxious person. Yet now, in the face of death, I felt only peace, joy, and an all-pervading sense of security. p. 32

Here in these verses we are talking about God's part in the whole thing. What is God going to do?

"NOW MAY THE GOD OF PEACE HIMSELF SANCTIFY YOU ENTIRELY (THROUGH AND THROUGH)."

The word "HIMSELF" is emphasized in the Greek text.

It is God "HIMSELF" who is going to:

"SANCTIFY YOU ENTIRELY (THROUGH AND THROUGH)."

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

God himself is sanctifying them to himself in every area.

This is cultivated by communion with our Lord.

Lenski points out:

No nook or corner of your life is to be left where the peace of God does not penetrate. It is to reign undisturbed in every province of your being, not just a partial Christianity. This is all the way.

1 Thessalonians 3:13

so that He may establish your hearts blameless in holiness in the presence of our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all His saints.

In essence he is praying here for his #1 concern, and that is to "complete what is lacking in their faith."

A holiness of life would be completing what was lacking in their faith. There would be growth and truth.

Paul fully realized that these dear Christian people in Thessalonica would not fully be consecrated through and through until they stood in the presence of the Lord Jesus "when these vile bodies are transformed into glorious bodies which are like unto His."

Horne observes:

"And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly." The apostle realizes that it is only through the power of God that His readers may be enabled to obey the injunctions just enjoined.

Hendricksen says:

This "through and through" is a rare word occurring only here in the New Testament. It is a plural adjective so that the literal meaning of the word in connection with nouns which it modifies is "you whole," that is, "the whole of each of you," "every part of each of you."

2 Corinthians 7:1

Therefore, having these promises, beloved, let us cleanse ourselves from all defilement of flesh and spirit, perfecting holiness in the fear of God.

2 Corinthians 6:17, 18

Therefore, come out from their midst and be separate," says the Lord. "And do not touch what is unclean; And I will welcome you. And I will be a father to you, And you shall be sons and daughters to Me," Says the Lord Almighty.

1 Peter 1:16, 17

because it is written, "You shall be holy, for I am holy." And if you address as Father the One who impartially judges according to each man's work, conduct yourselves in fear during the time of your stay upon earth;

1 John 3:3

And everyone who has this hope fixed on Him purifies himself, just as He is pure.

The 2ND PRAYER REQUEST in the 23rd verse is seen in the last phrase:

"AND MAY YOUR SPIRIT AND SOUL AND BODY BE PRESERVED COMPLETE, WITHOUT BLAME AT THE COMING OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST."

Walvoord says:

The word "whole" here refers to the parts of our natural life: our spirit, our soul, and our body. Each of these 3 parts should be preserved wholly to God and be used by God. That means that everything we are belongs to the Lord: our physical bodies, our spiritual or intellectual life, and our psychological or natural life.

Barnhouse says:

Paul concludes the section with his 3-fold benediction concerning the 3 parts of man's being. He says, "And the very God of peace sanctify you wholly; and I pray God your whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ." There are those who suggest that man has only a duality to his makeup--body and soul. This text clearly indicates soul, spirit and body. Hebrews 4:12 tells us that "the word of God which is the sharp sword of the Spirit is capable of dividing between the soul and spirit," indicating a decided difference between these 2 facets of man's tri-part being. Paul prays that each of these "be preserved blameless." In verse 24 he comes back full circle to the faithfulness of the great God who elected them (cf. 1:4), called them and will keep them.

Ryrie says:

The word wholly is found only here in the New Testament and is made up of 2 words, "complete" and "end." Thus the ideas of wholeness and completion are included. This is entire sanctification, and it is the work of God. It is further explained by the prayer that the whole spirit, soul, and body be preserved blameless. Some take this verse to prove the 3-fold nature of man (called trichotomy), but it is not best taken as a proof text for this. Paul is not analyzing man here (such an analysis would have to include "heart" and "mind") but he is praying for complete sanctification in aim and in extent, and it is the faithfulness of God which assures the answer to the prayer.

pp. 82-83

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Ogilvie says:

Our spirit, <u>pneuma</u>, is the most sublime and distinctive part of our creative nature. Unlike all other creatures, we have been given the capacity to know, communicate with and receive the Spirit of God. This is basic in Paul's thought throughout his writings. The blemished spirit of man, distorted by the fall can be healed and recreated as a result of reconciliation through faith in Christ. Our spirit can be the post-resurrection home of the living Christ, the Holy Spirit.

The "soul," according to Paul, is the self-conscious seed of personality including intellect, emotion and will. He uses the Greek word <u>psuche</u> for our thinking, feeling, deciding capacities. The word is used extensively throughout the New Testament: 48 times as soul, 40 times as life, 3 times as mind and once as heart. I am convinced that Paul used it in this Thessalonian passage very much as the Deuteronomy passage uses heart for thought, emotions and will. The inclusion of both spirit and soul was a careless, redundant coupling of synonyms. Paul wanted the Thessalonians to claim the capacity to know and receive God's Spirit, as well become responsible in exercising their full intellectual, emotional and volitional potential as an expression of their faith.

The third part of the trichotomy of the substantive elements of our nature is the body, <u>soma</u>. Paul was concerned about the physical health and purity of the body. Our spirits and souls dwell in our bodies; and the Holy Spirit dwells in our spirits and utilizes our souls to inspire our thoughts, engender our emotions and guide our wills. For Paul, the body is the temple of the Holy

Spirit. He called for reverence and care of the body as holy, sacred, set apart to glorify God. "Do you not know that your body is the temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you, whom you have from God, and you are not your own? For you were bought at a price [Calvary]; therefore glorify God in your body and in your spirit, which are God's" (1 Cor. 6:19, 20).

pp. 112-13

J. Vernon McGee says:

Man is a triune being: body, soul (mind) and spirit. "Sanctify you wholly," not perfectly, but we are to reach a place of maturation. We should not continue to be babes in Christ, we should be growing to maturity.

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(The Christian Salt & Light Company by Haddon W. Robinson)

As the Puritans claimed, "The man who feels not his need to be righteous is the man who needs it most desperately."
p. 60

Sometimes as I sit at my desk, I get very discouraged about what I don't know. The process of mourning about ignorance is not unlike what should be happening in my spiritual life. In sensing my need of God and staying continually aware of it, I draw closer to Him. When I do, I get upset about my sin. The light of His presence shows up the gravy stains in my life. But because I know God forgives my sin, I'm comforted. I know I am a forgiven sinner.

When we're worried about our sin, we don't honor God by thinking bad thoughts about it. We need to go to Him and simply experience His grace and comfort. That is blessedness.

That is why H. G. Stafford wrote:

My sin--oh, the bliss of this glorious tho't, My sin--not in part, but the whole Is nailed to the cross and I bear it no more, Praise the Lord, praise the Lord, O my soul! p. 47

Fred Smith told about a couple who took in a messed-up young girl. She lived with them for a year and went through all kinds of problems. Every evening after supper they did something that ultimately made a difference in the girl's life. They had her repeat, "God does not love me because I am good. He loves me because I am precious, and I am precious because Christ died for me."

p. 48

"AND MAY YOUR SPIRIT AND SOUL AND BODY BE PRESERVED COMPLETE."

The Bible Knowledge Commentary, speaking of the Spirit, says:

It is the highest and most unique part that enables us to commune with God. The soul is conscious of himself, the seat of personality. The body is the physical part through which the inner person expresses himself.

"AND MAY YOUR SPIRIT AND SOUL AND BODY BE PRESERVED COMPLETE, WITHOUT BLAME AT THE COMING OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST."

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

Paul was saying then that he desired that the Thessalonians would be kept blameless by God in their relationships with Him, in their inner personal lives and in their social contacts with other people.

The word "BLAMELESS" means "no legitimate grounds for accusation."

1 Thessalonians 2:10

You are witnesses, and [so is] God, as to how devoutly and uprightly and blamelessly we proved ourselves among you who are believing;

Isaiah 1:18

"Come now, let us reason together," says the Lord. "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they are red as crimson, they shall be like wool.

Ephesians 5:26, 27

that He might sanctify her, having cleansed her by the washing of water with the word, that He might present to Himself the church in all her glory, having no spot or wrinkle or any such thing; but that she should be holy and blameless.

Jude 24, 25

Now to Him who is able to keep you from stumbling, and to make you stand in the presence of His glory blameless with great joy, to the only God our Savior, through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, dominion and authority, before all time and now and forever. Amen.

2 Corinthians 5:17

Therefore if any man is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come.

Philippians 2:12, 13

So then, my beloved, just as you have always obeyed, not as in my presence only, but now much more in my absence, work out your salvation with fear and trembling; for it is God who is at work in you, both to will and to work for His good pleasure.

Romans 3:23, 24

for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, being justified as a gift by His grace through the redemption which is in Christ Jesus;

Paul now makes another reference to the coming of the Lord Jesus even as he has in every other chapter in this epistle.

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Harold J. Ockenga, in commenting on this verse, points out:

Sanctification is a work of God's free grace, whereby we are renewed in the whole man after the image of God and are enabled more and more to die unto sin and to live unto righteousness.

Because of the admonitions in the 4th chapter this was a very deep concern of the apostle Paul that these Thessalonians would walk in a holy way.

If we were to summarize Paul's prayer we would just say that it is a prayer for BLAMELESS PRESERVATION.

Horne says:

The thought concerns preservation in the day of judgment itself, not unto that day. Then we shall be guarded by God himself. "Be preserved" is a passive voice, throwing the emphasis upon the fact that He is the One who shall do the keeping. God not only preserves us blameless until the parousia but He shall also do such in that day.

Ogilvie says:

Wholeness then, is the maximum development of our lives, spiritually, intellectually, emotionally, volitionally, physically and relationally. It encompasses our relationships with God, self, others, and our life in the world. One last thing needs to be said: Nothing debilitates wholeness more than the emphasis on one of these aspects of our nature to the neglect of the rest. We all know people who are intent on one or more to the exclusion of the others. The Lord wants us to live fully in all dimensions without imbalance or distortion.

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LOOK CLOSE

Warn those who are unruly, comfort the fainthearted, uphold the weak, be patient with all.

--1 Thess. 5:14

Imagine what the game of bowling would be like if you couldn't see the pins you were trying to hit. In 1933, Bill Knox did just that--and bowled a perfect game.

In Philadelphia's Olney Alleys, Bill had a screen placed just above the foul line to obscure his view of the lane. His purpose was to demonstrate the technique of spot bowling, which involves throwing the ball at a selected floor mark on the near end of the lane. Like many bowlers, Bill knew that you can do better if you aim at a mark close to you that's in line with the pins. He proved his point with a perfect 300 game of 12 strikes in a row.

Spot bowling illustrates part of a wise approach to life. When Paul wrote to the Thessalonians about the return of Christ, he reminded them that the ultimate goal of their salvation was to "be preserved blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ" (5:23). Paul taught them to focus their eyes on near actions that were in line with that goal. He urged them to comfort one another, help the weak, warn the wayward, pray without ceasing, and rejoice always. Then he added that we must do this in the power of Christ who is working in us (vv. 23-24).

Lord, help us to see what we can do today that will keep us focused on Your eternal goal for us.

1 Thessalonians 5:23

The National Safety Council reports that most accidents on the job happen for the following reasons: (1) Handling and lifting objects; (2) Falling--like tipping over in a chair or slipping on spilled coffee; (3) Getting hit by a falling object--often when protective equipment is not worn; (4) Being injured by machinery--usually due to a safety guard not in its proper place; (5) Stepping on or bumping into something.

The Christian life also involves many dangers. As a matter of fact, there's a striking parallel between the points listed above and the causes for spiritual accidents. For example, we hurt ourselves by trying to lift loads of responsibility in our own strength. Then too, we often fall into sin over little things. And all of us get hit daily by Satan's propaganda through the media. Then there are those occasions when we must go into high-risk situations where great spiritual peril exists. And finally, we get bruised from bumping into adverse circumstances because we don't follow God's way.

Today's Scripture tells us how to avoid becoming a spiritual casualty. We must do good (v. 15), rejoice in our faith (v. 16), pray about everything (v. 17), thank God in all circumstances (v. 18), let His Spirit control us (v. 19), take His Word to heart (v. 20), and steer clear of all forms of evil (v. 22). No wonder Paul could pray that our "whole spirit and soul and body be preserved blameless unto the coming of our Lord." He himself had tested the effectiveness of these protective measures.

Let us take a brief moment to reflect on the present condition of our SPIRIT, SOUL and BODY.

1. The SPIRIT points us toward God. God communicates to us through our spirit.

2.Our SOUL refers to ourself. Our soul is the expression of the spirit.

Whereas we have the WISH in verse 23,

we have the WARRANTY in verse 24.

That which is described in verse 23 is totally impossible to be accomplished from a human perspective, but from God's point of view, He is not only the One who is calling us, but He is the One who is also going to do it.

This is the KEY VERSE to our study for we see here the secret to living the victorious Christian life.

God is not only calling us to a holiness of life but He has made possible for us to have the Savior resident within our lives and also the power of the Spirit to live a life of holiness which is acceptable in His sight.

2 Corinthians 4:7

But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the surpassing greatness of the power may be of God and not from ourselves;

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

The same God who calls a Christian will perform this by the Holy Spirit who indwells him. God is faithful to bring to completion the work He has begun in believers. God does not save a person by grace and then leave him alone to work out his Christian growth by works. As God calls and justifies by grace He sanctifies by grace too.

The word "FAITHFUL" is in the emphatic position in the Greek text and we can say, "Yes, God is faithful."

<u>Numbers 23:19</u>

God is not a man, that he should lie, nor a son of man, that he should change his mind. Does he speak and then not act?

Does he promise and not fulfill?

Psalm 117:1, 2

Praise the Lord, all you nations; extol him, all you peoples.
For great is his love toward us, and the faithfulness of the Lord endures forever.
Praise the Lord.

Lamentations 3:22, 23

Because of the Lord's great love we are not consumed, for his compassions never fail.

They are new every morning; great is your faithfulness.

J. Vernon McGee says:

You can depend upon God.

Horne says of this verse:

The absolute use of "DO" is very striking and sets in bold relief the doing which accompanies His calling. God, in addition to being a Caller, is also a Doer. He who initially calls us into His kingdom will perform through all of us His holy will. He will bring to completion that which he has begun.

Walvoord says:

No one can sanctify himself. God has to set us apart as holy to himself, and the great truth here is: "Faithful is He who is going to do this."

Barnes says:

That is, your sanctification after all depends on Him and as He has begun a work of grace in your hearts, you may depend on His faithfulness to complete it.

Ockenga says:

The encouragement to such sanctification is given in the words "Faithful is He who calleth you, who will also do it." God puts the standard before us and the desire in us and provides the means for us to achieve it. He will not mock us, disappoint us or frustrate us. God now calls us to sanctify ourselves by consecration, confession and commitment that we may be holy both now and when He comes. God has given us the Holy Spirit to fill us, enable us and to perform this work in us. "Therefore, work out your own salvation with fear and trembling for it is God that works in you, both to will and to do of His good pleasure."

Lenski says:

"Faithful" equals we may trust him. That is why he is here named "he who calls you," for why this call if he is not faithful, if we cannot depend upon him to do this, i.e., to sanctify and preserve.

p. 368

Stedman says:

Finally Paul ends his letter with a benediction of peace. May your whole spirit, soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. He will do it. God is able to minister to the whole person--spirit, soul and body,--and He will. Full provision has already been made. Let us utilize it. Rest on his faithfulness, choose to obey and He will give you power to perform. But He will not give you power to perform until you make the choice to obey.

Ogilvie says:

Faithfulness describes the Lord's consistency, integrity and punctuality in intervening in our lives to bring growth in our total nature through all of life's ups and downs.

The question is: Calling us to what?

1. He is calling us to a RELATIONSHIP:

2.He is calling us to SUFFER:

1 Peter 2:21

For you have been called for this purpose, since Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example for you to follow in His steps,

Philippians 1:29

For to you it has been granted for Christ's sake, not only to believe in Him, but also to suffer for His sake,

Isaiah 48:10, 11

See, I have refined you, though not as silver; I have tested you in the furnace of affliction. For my own sake, for my own sake, I do this. How can I let myself be defamed? I will not yield my glory to another.

3. We are called to SACRIFICE:

Luke 9:23

And He was saying to them all, "If anyone wishes to come after Me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross daily, and follow Me.

6.He is calling us to GLORIFICATION:

Because the Lord Himself will come down from heaven with a cry of command, with the voice of an archangel, and with the call of the trumpet sounded by God's command; and the dead in Christ shall be raised first.

Revelation 22:17

And the Spirit and the bride say, "Come." And let the one who hears say, "Come." And let the one who is thirsty come; let the one who wishes take the water of life without cost.

Maybe you can sense that He is calling you just now. Would you respond with the words of Charlotte Elliott:

Just as I am, without one plea, But that Thy blood was shed for me, And that Thou bidst me come to Thee; Oh, Lamb of God, I come, I come.

To Thee whose blood can cleanse each spot;

The 2 KEY WORDS in the verse are the words:

- 1. "CALLING"
- 2. "DOING."

When our text says, "WHO ALSO WILL DO IT," we ask the question:

DO WHAT?

Psalm 138:8

The Lord will fulfill his purpose for me; your love, O Lord, endures forever-do not abandon the works of your hands.

<u>Titus 3:5</u>

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HABITS--GOOD AND BAD

There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death. Proverbs 16:25

The dictionary defines a habit as "an established course, of action or behavior." All habits begin with a single act, but usually we don't expect them to become a permanent part of our character.

Across the lawn at the rear of our house is a diagonal path extending from the garden gate to the sidewalk. The only deviation in it is the bend around the flowerbed. This strip of ground has been packed down by hundreds of repeated footsteps, and not a spear of grass grows on it. It's the record of a **habit.** The trail is a shortcut worn down by our grandchildren going from home to school and back again. Years ago one of them saw the advantage of this step-saving way, and it became a regular route day after day. Others followed the example, and now everyone **habitually** takes the same shortcut.

In this case, of course, using the garden path is a harmless habit. But bad practices are formed in the same way. For instance, the poor alcoholic can remember when he took his first step on the evil road which led him ever downward. There was a time when he could have said, "NO!" But his continual yielding to temptation not only formed a path but a rut that daily became deeper and deeper. This is true of every habit. It seems so innocent at the beginning, but if it is the wrong thing to do, it will bind us and drag us down.

How important to establish good patterns of life such as prayer and Bible reading. **This will keep us out of sin's rut.** Don't forget, the **first step** is the important one. You can't repeat what you haven't done before.

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"FOR THIS I HAVE JESUS"

In an evangelistic meeting in Ireland the speaker was explaining what it means to abide in Christ and to trust Him completely in every trial. Concluding his message, he repeated several times, "It means that in every circumstance you can keep on saying, 'For this I have Jesus.'" The meeting was then opened for testimonies. The young lady who had been at the piano stood up and said, "I have to leave shortly so I'd like to be the first to testify. Just a few minutes ago I was handed this telegram. It reads, 'Mother is very ill; take train home immediately.' When I saw those words, I knew that tonight's message was meant just for me. My heart looked up and said, 'For this I have Jesus.' Instantly a peace and strength flooded my soul." After pausing a moment, she continued, "I have never traveled very far alone, but for this I have Jesus. And for all the strain and suspense that goes with the thought of Mother's severe illness, I praise God that for this too I have Jesus."

Three or four weeks later the evangelist received a letter from the same woman. It read, "Thank you again for the message you gave that day. Life has become an uninterrupted psalm of victory, for I have come to realize that no matter what life brings, for this I have Jesus."

Since it is the divine plan for Him not only to call you but also to do it, will you let Him?

For Jacob, he wrestled at Pennial; and for Jacob, it was a crisis with Benjamin. When he let go, God began to work.

Would you not surrender, submit, and give it all to Jesus? Your work, your marriage, your kids--just let go of the whole package and turn it over to Him.

The question that we are asking in this final study in making our SPIRITUAL CHECKUP is:

ARE YOU PLUGGED IN?

Is the power of God flowing freely through your life?

Does the Holy Spirit have control of you?

Does He find a clean, clear channel through which He can operate?

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John 15:5

I am the vine, you are the branches; he who abides in Me, and I in him, he bears much fruit; for apart from Me you can do nothing.

Ephesians 2:10

For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.

Here then is the secret to the believer's source of power. That is, to recognize the fact that God does not expect us to live an effective Christian life, but that He is faithful, and He is willing to live that supernatural life through us to bring glory and praise to Himself.

The big question that faces us is: Are we willing to be hooked up to that supernatural power that is available to us in order that this life might be effectively displayed in our human bodies?

2 Corinthians 2:14-17

But thanks be to God, who always leads us in His triumph in Christ, and manifests through us the sweet aroma of the knowledge of Him in every place. For we are a fragrance of Christ to God among those who are being saved and among those who are perishing; to the one an aroma from death to death, to the other an aroma from life to life. And who is adequate for these things?

For we are not like many, peddling the word of God, but as from sincerity, but as from God, we speak in Christ in the sight of God.

Colossians 2:9, 10

For in Him all the fulness of Deity dwells in bodily form, and in Him you have been made complete, and He is the head over all rule and authority;

When Grover Cleveland neared the end of his life, he lamented, "I have tried so hard to do the right." The Bible Knowledge Commentary points out:

In these final verses we have 3 more exhortations and the benediction.

There were 19 COMMANDS in our previous study and now in <u>verses 25, 26, and 27</u> we have COMMANDS 20, 21, AND 22.

The first word in the emphatic position is the word "BRETHREN." The word occurs in:

verse 25,

verse 26,

and verse 27.

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

The word occurs 15 times in the epistle.

Here Paul is making a request of them. He is asking them to pray for him.

He begins the letter by telling them that he is praying for them, and now in conclusion, he is asking them to return the favor by praying for him.

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The Bible Knowledge Commentary reminds us:

This request is in the present tense and could be translated "keep on praying for us."

2 Corinthians 3:5

Not that we are adequate in ourselves to consider anything as coming from ourselves, but our adequacy is from God,

Barclay observes:

But there is one very lovely saying here: "Brothers," said Paul, "pray for us." Surely it is a wonderful thing that the greatest saint of them all should feel that he was strengthened by the prayer of the humblest Christian.

Once his friends came to congratulate a great statesman who had been elected to the highest office which this country could offer him. His answer was, "Don't give me your congratulations, but give me your prayers."

For Paul, prayer was a golden chain in which he prayed for others and others prayed for him.

Ockenga says:

The ministry of the church is dependant upon prayer. Paul had very definite needs: physically, he was in constant danger; and he suffered persecution, beatings, shipwreck, robbery, imprisonment and illness. Mentally, he had times of depression and discouragement because of the difficulties which he faced in his preaching and because of the hostility of his fellow countrymen who tried to pervert his teaching. Spiritually, he faced the attacks of the devil.

The needs of ministers are no different today. Spiritually, they need to be supported by prayer so that they may have adequate devotion, enlightenment, empowerment and efficiency in the gospel of Jesus Christ. Pray that they are soul-winners, witnesses, reformers and teachers. Physically, they need strength to meet incessant demands which are made upon them. And mentally they need to be kept alert to the new currents of thought and to interpret Christianity in the face of these intellectual movements.

Barnes says:

He was a man of like passions as others, pliable to the same temptations, engaged in an arduous work, often called to meet with opposition and exposed to peril and want, he peculiarly needed the prayers of the people of God. A minister, surrounded as he is by temptations, is in great danger if he has not the prayers of his people. Without those prayers he will be likely to accomplish little in the cause of his Master. His own devotions in the sanctuary will be formal and frigid and the word which he preaches will be likely to come from a cold and heavy heart and to fall also on cold and heavy hearts. There is no way in which a people can better advance the cause of piety in their own hearts than by praying much for their minister.

Walvoord says:

Verse 25 is a very understandable exhortation. Paul writes, "Brethren, pray for us. We need prayer." It takes prayer and the work of the Holy Spirit to accomplish any true work for God.

Horne says:

It is an impressive feature indeed to note that the greatest saint of them all felt it necessary to be strengthened by the continued prayers of these lowly Christians.

Hogg and Vine point out:

Paul and his co-workers, their spiritual vigor, gifts and experience notwithstanding, shared the common need of the sanctifying and preserving power of God, and hence, were not independent of the prayers of the saints.

Ellicott points out:

The prayer was doubtless intended to include reference both to his own personal state and to the general success of his apostolic work.

Lange says:

In the church militant, one member should help another and may well seek that other's help.

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SHUT IN BUT NOT SHUT OUT

Brethren, pray for us.

--1 Thessalonians 5:25

One of the greatest ministries a Christian can have is that of praying for the needs of others. That's why a person who is forced to rest after an accident or illness never needs to feel useless or uninvolved in the Lord's work. A unique opportunity of Christian service becomes open to him or her --to uphold family, friends, church, pastor, and missionaries in prayer.

In his book <u>Keep On Keeping On</u>, Harold L. Fickett, Jr. told about his call on a woman who had suffered a severe heart attack. Confined to her home, she was very discouraged. She complained to Pastor Fickett about her uselessness. Oh, how she wanted to do some meaningful work for the Lord! Fickett told her kindly that in her new situation she could minister with power. "You have time on your hands," he said. "You have no place to go. You can use your time in praying for God's servants all over the world. Begin by remembering me as your pastor before the throne of God, and then pray for all of the Christian workers you know." The woman followed her pastor's advice, and she found joy and a new sense of purpose in life.

Prayer for others, especially God's servants, is a much-needed ministry, and it's something every Christian can do. There's no reason a shut-in has to feel shut out from the Lord's work.

v.26 Greet all the brethren with a holy kiss.

Whereas <u>COMMAND #20</u> in <u>verse 25</u> was:

"Brethren, be praying also for us,"

now COMMAND #21 in verse 26 is:

"GREET ALL THE BRETHREN WITH A HOLY KISS."

"A KISS" in Paul's time was an expression of respect and affection. It was a token of homage and submission.

I think this can be seen in the KISS OF JUDAS at the betrayal of Christ.

I will always remember my sons during their growing up days, saying that, "This verse meant that brothers should shake hands and pat each other on the back."

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

It is an outward physical expression of true Christian love. It is holy, not passionate or fleshly. In our Western culture, an embrace, a pat on the back, a handshake is acceptable.

Phillips paraphrases it by saying:

"Give a handshake all 'round among the brotherhood."

Hendricksen points out:

It was <u>holy</u> because it was a symbol of spiritual oneness in Christ. It was, moreover, a seal of <u>Christian</u> affection, the feeling which members of one and the same spiritual household cherish for one another.

pp. 142-43

Horne says:

The sense is: "Convey my greetings to all with a kiss that is holy," as a token of

friendship and brotherly love. The modern counterpart would be the handshake.

that may prove difficult to accurately attribute

Any use of material without proper citation is unintentional

J. Vernon McGee says:

This is a commandment too, just make sure it is a holy kiss. In our culture and with our customs, a warm handshake will do.

v.27 I am binding you with an oath by the Lord that this letter be read to all the brethren.

This is COMMAND #22, the final command in this 5th chapter.

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

The words "I am binding you with an oath" are suggesting God would discipline them if they disobeyed.

There are 2 POSSIBILITIES as to why he feels it necessary to make this kind of statement:

- 1. There might be problems in the Thessalonian church that we are not aware of.
- 2. Paul might be speaking from the point of view that he is aware of divine inspiration in this writing.

Maybe both of these things are possible.

Hendricksen suggests:

This solemn charge or adjuration is not surprising. The contents of the epistle is important, both with respect to teaching and with respect to admonition. It is very well possible that some of the disorderly persons, upon hearing that a letter from the missionaries had arrived and suspecting that it contained some admonitions intended especially for them, might wish to be absent when it was read aloud to the congregation. So Paul stresses the fact that by all means every person in the church must hear the letter! The adjuration implies a threat of divine punishment if this be not done. Yet, the charge contains no bitterness, note the term of endearment: brothers. p. 144

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Lenski says:

We naturally wonder why Paul should use this strong final adjuration. In the first place, it demands that the letter be read to the congregation, for this is what "all the brethren" means. It was not to pass from hand to hand so that it would not reach some. That too is why the passive is used. In the second place, this letter was not carried to Thessalonica by Silvanus and Timothy but by an ordinary messenger and would be handed to some Christian, perhaps not even to an elder in Thessalonica.

Hogg and Vine point out:

This word for "I bind you by an oath" only occurs here in the New Testament.

They also make the following comment on the phrase "TO ALL THE BRETHREN":

"To all," that is to say, without distinction, limitation or exception. There is no secret code in Christianity, no esoteric mystery for the initiated few. All God's spiritual gifts are intended for all God's children. The apostle had a message from God to deliver to all the saints and each individual believer was personally and directly responsible to God for his own hearing and understanding of that message and for his own obedience to it.

Barnes points out:

Injunctions of this kind occurring in the epistles look as if the apostles regarded themselves as under the influence of inspiration and as having authority to give infallible instructions to the churches.

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(Charismatic Chaos by John F. MacArthur, Jr.)

The canon is <u>not</u> still open. God's Word, made of the Old and New Testaments, is one unique miracle. It came together over a period of fifteen hundred years. More than forty men of God, prophets and apostles, wrote God's words--every jot and tittle--without error and in perfect harmony. No hymn is worthy to be compared to Scripture. No modern prophecy or word of wisdom is even in the same realm with God's eternal Word. Heaven and earth will pass away; God's Word will abide (Matt. 5:18). p. 54

Sun Myung Moon, self-styled messiah from Korea, claims he is a divine messenger from God. Moon says he has the ultimate truth--not from Scripture, not from literature, and not from any person's brain. According to Moon, if his "truth" contradicts the Bible (and it does), then the Bible is wrong. p. 81

v.28 The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you.

Paul ends the letter as he began.

1 Thessalonians 1:1

Paul and Silvanus and Timothy to the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace.

It is "THE GRACE OF OUR LORD JESUS CHRIST" which is so important; and it is the grace which is manifested through His death, burial and resurrection which makes us a new creation in the Savior.

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The Bible Knowledge Commentary calls verse 28 the BENEDICTION:

Paul's concern was that his readers experience and enjoy this grace. All that one has in Christ is due to His grace.

Walvoord says:

As Paul wrote this to the Thessalonian Christians, so may the grace of God, His favor, His enablement, be made real in all our lives.

Know and recognize that it is Satan's desire:

with regard to SANCTIFICATION to keep you CHILDISH and CARNAL.

It is God's desire with regard to salvation for you to be in His family.

His desire for you with regard to sanctification is that you might be maturing in Christ and that fruit is being produced through you.
