THE IMPOSSIBLE DREAM

I never understood why babies were created with all the component parts necessary for a rich, full life . . . with the unfinished plumbing left to amateurs.

If it was a matter of money, there isn't a mother in this world who wouldn't have chipped in a few extra bucks to have the kid completely assembled, trained, and ready to take on long trips.

As it is, mothers stumble along trying to toilet-train their babies by clumsily running water to create an atmosphere and holding sea shells to their ear to suggest rushing water. I used to turn on every faucet in the house and showed slides of Lake Erie while the kid sat there unrolling johnny paper.

I even used to threaten them. I had one kid whom I vowed I would send to the Army with diapers. I threatened him with other things too: a bed with a hole in it, a bicycle with portable plumbing, and an alarm system that rang when wet and lit up a sign on his back that read, LOOK FOR THE RAINBOW.

The whole affair was pretty ridiculous. But then aren't we all when the most important thing in our lives is succeeding vicariously through our children?

Now I note that a new "training kit" has come on the market guaranteed to cut toilet training time up to 90 per cent. (With some kids that adds up roughly to two weeks before football practice.)

It's a little throne with a built-in music box. When the baby has performed . . . and not until . . . the music box rewards him with a little tune.

I first saw it in the bathroom of my next-door neighbor, Gloria. "Hey, that's terrific," I said. "What does it play?" "The Impossible Dream," she said dryly.

"Then, you're having some success with it?" I asked hopefully.

"Not really," she said. "Todd isn't too swift. The first time I put him on, he sat there frozen and scared like he had just been asked to fly the thing to Cuba. So I explained to him, 'Todd, if you do your thing you will hear music."

"Did he understand that?"

"Not a word. He sat there a couple of hours and finally I took him off, went to the kitchen, got a glass of water poured it into the bowl. The music came out and Todd clapped his hands and danced around like he was seeing the circus for the first time. Then I put him on it again and he sat there for another couple of hours."

Gary is a thirty-nine-year-old executive moving on the fast track. He has just entered his nearly barren apartment after another long day at the office . . . striding across the living room he flicks on the TV to catch what's left of the 11:00 o'clock news. He peels off his jacket and tie, grabs a cold bottle of Molson's from the near-empty refrigerator, and sprawls across the sofa, pushing aside some newspapers.

Relaxing now for the first time that day, Gary takes a look around the room and reminds himself <u>again</u> that he'd better get some more furniture and fix the place up. Divorced for almost a year, his apartment still has a warehouse flavor . . . <u>Too much excitement at work right now</u>. Just don't have the time. I've got the opportunity of a lifetime and I'm not about to get sidetracked and blow it.

A smirk comes over Gary's face. He's thinking about his successful put-down and humiliation of an office rival earlier that day at a meeting with top executives of his division. He can do it good, all right. And with finesse; like a knife through butter. Nothing crude about this guy.

They know him at the office as hard-working and very aggressive. Savvy about the ins and outs of the system, and always ready to lunge for the next project or opportunity that comes along. A real go-for-it man. But that's only part of the picture. He is playing a high-stakes game in an organization that has a destructively competitive environment at the top, where everyone is constantly maneuvering to do each other in as they try to climb higher and higher.

Soon the sound of the TV anchorman fades as Gary drifts off to sleep, where he encounters an old companion: a recurring dream of walking down a long, empty corridor in his office building. As he walks along he feels mounting tension, and each time he passes an office doorway he strikes a karate pose, anticipating some unseen attacker. Eventually he passes a door to the stairway. It springs open. Standing there is a person wearing a frogman's suit and mask. The figure points a speargun at Gary. Without saying a word, he fires it at Gary's heart. In slow motion, Gary watches it penetrate his chest and feels it tearing into his beating heart, which pours forth great torrents of blood. And then he wakes up screaming.

J. B. Phillips, in his Letters to Young Churches, points out:

The great difference between present-day Christianity and that of which we read in these letters is that to us it is primarily a performance, to them it was a real experience. We are apt to reduce the Christian religion to a code, or at best, a rule of heart and life. To these men it was quite plainly the invasion of their lives by a new quality of life altogether. They do not hesitate to describe this as "Christ living in them." Mere moral reformation will hardly explain the transformation and the exuberant vitality of these men's lives. Even if we could prove a motive for such reformation, and certainly the world around offered little encouragement to the early Christians, we are practically drawn to accept their own explanation which is that their little human lives had through Christ been linked up to the very life of God.

Thomas Carlysle, one of England's greatest historians, once apologetically remarked about his own religious faith, that he was living on the after-shine of his father's religion.

We suspect that there are altogether too many these days whose religious faith is only the after-shine or perhaps the after-shine of the after-shine of the religion of their fathers. A 2nd or 3rd generation of religious influence rather than a 1st hand experience with God. How comforting to know that God is with us. How dreadful to realize that He is not with us. If He is not with us, it is because we have turned away from Him. Just turn around and He is there in all His wonderful presence ready to make us His own for time and eternity.

I am afraid that a lot of us have to admit that our lives are really not what they should be when it comes to being an effective witness for Christ. It is far easier to conform to the patterns of those around us rather than to stand and live a life for God the way He would want it to be.

In making a SPIRITUAL CHECKUP, we want to raise the question:

IS YOUR LIFE A WITNESS?

We have looked together at a number of things thus far in our study.

We have asked ourselves the questions:

- 1. Did you make the right start?
- 2. Are you a phony?
- 3. Has Satan hindered you?
- 4. Are you discouraged by the problems?
- 5. Are you an encouragement to others in your walk with the Lord?
- 6. How is your prayer life?

In our last study we talked about:

7. Have you gotten dirty?

Now the question for STUDY #8:

IS YOUR LIFE A WITNESS?

William Barclay says:

This passage begins with praise but it ends in warning. And with the warning we come to the immediate situation behind this letter. Paul urged the Thessalonians to keep calm, to mind their own business and to go on working with their hands. The preaching of the second coming had produced an odd and awkward situation in Thessalonica. The result of it had been that many of the Thessalonians had given up their daily work and were standing about in excited groups, upsetting themselves and everybody else while they waited for the second coming to arrive. Ordinary life had been disrupted. The problem of making a living had been abandoned and they waited excitedly for Christ to come.

Hendricksen says:

A new admonition is now added. Nevertheless, it is not entirely new. Love to the brothers is another illustration of sanctification, mentioned in verse 3. Moreover, in verse 6 defrauding a brother was prohibited. Hence it is not surprising that something is now said with reference to loving the brothers.

Ryrie says:

Christianity should always be distinguished by purity and love. This latter is the next thing in which Paul asks the Thessalonians to abound.

Here he is picking up on what he mentioned in his prayer in chapter 3:12:

1 Thessalonians 3:12

and may the Lord cause you to increase and abound in love for one another, and for all men, just as we also do for you;

Having talked to us about the love relationship between the husband and wife, now he is going to talk to us about the love relationship among us and our friends.

John 13:34, 35

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another, even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this all men will know that you are My disciples, if you have love for one another.

When it comes to the subject of BROTHERLY LOVE, Paul says:

"you are not having need that I should be writing to you,"

and the reason that he gives is:

"for you yourselves are taught by God to love one another."

A number of times previously in the letter we have noted that Paul has not had to give further instructions on some of these matters because he had told them about these things before, but now when he comes to this matter of brotherly love, he points out the fact that this is something they have learned from God by themselves.

John 6:45

It is written in the prophets, "And they shall all be taught of God." Every one who has heard and learned from the Father, comes to Me.

Walvoord says:

In vv. 9 and 10, Christian love is introduced in contrast to lust. What a difference! He tells them, "But as touching brotherly love (which ought to characterize the Christian) you need not that I write unto you for ye yourselves are taught of God to love one another, and, indeed, you do it toward all the brethren which are in all Macedonia. But we beseech ye, brethren, that ye increase more and more." Love is a growing experience. We should increase more and more in our love.

Hogg and Vine say:

Love of the brethren is not expressed in words but in deeds (1 John 3:18), in mutual affection and respect (Rom. 12:10), in hospitality to the friendless and in sympathy with those who suffer (Heb. 13:1-3)--and that not in a bargaining or grudging spirit, nicely calculating less or more but with generous warmth (1 Pet. 1:22; Matt. 10:8); for love's strength stands in love's sacrifice. Where love is, love cannot be hid but will find a way to prove itself in service, whether of life (1 John 3:16) or possessions (v. 17).

1 John 3:18

Little children, let us not love with word or with tongue, but in deed and truth.

James 2:8-10

If, however, you are fulfilling the royal law, according to the Scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself," you are doing well. But if you show partiality, you are committing sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles in one point, he has become guilty of all.

When was the last time your pastor grandstanded the blue-collar worker, the Central American alien laborer, or the grocery-bag stuffer as a wonderful Christian who is living wholesomely for Jesus? What TV preacher is bumping celebrities from the roster of guests in exchange for the "nobodies" who send in a large percentage of their social security check each month?

The majority of us are failures by both our culture's and our church's standards. p. 72

When last did your pastor or Robert Schuller or Pat Robertson or Fred Price put someone up front to tell the story of how he or she failed in business and now everything is gone--car, house, and company? No good ending of how the Lord came through, blessed me with much more than before, brought me through the fiery trial back to success. No, now I just work for the local school district as a janitor. In fact, how many janitors are on your church's governing board?

It is heartbreaking to meet Christians who have served with their best efforts but have not succeeded in fulfilling the expectations of those around them. pp. 72-73

"FOR YOU YOURSELVES ARE TAUGHT BY GOD."

This is the only place in the New Testament where this phrase occurs:

"TAUGHT BY GOD."

Barnes says:

They were so taught of God in regard to this duty that they did not need any special instruction.

Stedman observes:

Paul told the Thessalonians that he did not need to teach them how to love one another. His amazing claim was that God through His Holy Spirit would teach them. "God has poured out His love into our hearts by the Holy Spirit whom He has given us," said the apostle in Romans 5:5. If we welcome that love of the Spirit we will be able to manifest love toward others. If we choose to be bitter, of course, then love will not be manifested, but if we reject the caustic word, the sharp attitude, then we can show kindness, mercy and grace. The Holy Spirit gives believers a new capacity to love that the worldling does not possess.

J. Vernon McGee points out:

Notice that after Paul speaks of the Holy Spirit, brotherly love is the first thing that he mentions. He writes, "As touching brotherly love, you need not that I write unto you, for you yourselves are taught of God to love one another." I believe that love is the identifying mark of a child of God.

1 Thessalonians 4:8

Therefore, the one who is rejecting [this] is not rejecting man but God who also is giving his Holy Spirit to us.

To be "TAUGHT BY GOD" is to be one who is the recipient of the teaching ministry of the Holy Spirit.

John 14:26

But the Helper, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in My name, He will teach you all things, and bring to your remembrance all that I said to you.

John 16:13

But when He, the Spirit of truth, comes, He will guide you into all the truth; for He will not speak on His own initiative, but whatever He hears, He will speak; and He will disclose to you what is to come.

It is the indwelling Holy Spirit who teaches us and produces this love that he is speaking about here in <u>verse 9</u>.

Romans 5:5

and hope does not disappoint, because the love of God has been poured out within our hearts through the Holy Spirit who was given to us.

<u>Galatians 5:22, 23</u>

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law.

It is the Holy Spirit who teaches us truth, and the fruitage of His presence in our lives is love.

Isaiah 54:13

All your sons will be taught by the Lord, and great will be your children's peace.

Isaiah 30:21

Whether you turn to the right or to the left, your ears will hear a voice behind you, saying, "This is the way; walk in it."

Psalm 46:10

Be still, and know that I am God; I will be exalted among the nations, I will be exalted in the earth.

It pleases God when we love one another. To love one another is the way God wants it.

Isobel Kuhn has an interesting statement with regard to this matter of love between the brethren:

To live above with saints we love, Oh that will be grace and glory. To live below with saints we know, Oh that's a different story. How often we fail in this regard in our Christian walk in that we are not a real witness to the outside world because of our lack of love for those who know Christ. On the other hand, there have been many who have been won to Christ simply by the love they have seen displayed between those who know our Savior.

Hannah Hurnard speaks with regard to this matter of love when she says:

There is one law by which we live.
Love loves to give and give and give,
And on this royal law so named
the universe itself is framed.
No lasting joy is anywhere
Save in the hearts of those who share.

Life yields a thousandfold more
To those who practice love's great law,
That love is far too weak and small
Which will love some but not love all.
If love to one it will decline,
'Tis human love and not divine.

Love cannot be content to rest
Till the beloved is fully blessed.
Love leaps to succor all who fall
And finds his joy in giving all.
Love will bear and will forgive,
Love will suffer long,
Die to self that she may live,
Triumph over wrong.

Nothing can true love destroy.
She will suffer all with joy.
From resentment love will turn,
When men hate, will bless.
She a lamb like grace will learn
To love more, not less.
Only bearing can beget strength

Augustine rephrased Jesus' words when he said, "To love those who love you is human; to hate those who love you is demonic; but to love those who hate you is divine." When we love our enemies as well as our friends, we reflect the character of God. p. 176

True love flows from the streams of humility.

(<u>Fire in Your Heart</u> by Sammy Tippit)

True humility is derived from a knowledge of God. The more we get to know Him, the more we are broken of pride and self-centeredness. p. 69

It is interesting when the searchlight of the scripture is put upon our lives and deals with the impact we should be making on the world around us. The focus is not on the lip and what we say but on the love which we display.

The central focus of this passage is going to be on:

LOVE,

and LIFE,

and not on the LIP.

If we were to try to describe an effective witness for the Lord Jesus Christ, we would see the following 3 THINGS in order of their priority:

- 1.LOVE which is produced by the Holy Spirit who dwells within us.
- 2.LIFE which demonstrates Christ living in us by attitudes and actions.
- 3. The LIP it is last. We earn the right to use the lip by the demonstration of our love and life.

Whereas the focus of verse 9 is upon the LOVE,

the focus of <u>verse 12</u> is upon the LIFE.

Here in <u>verse 10</u> we have the 2nd reason that Paul does not need to be writing to them about "brotherly love."

The 1st was in verse 9:

"for you yourselves are taught by God to love one another."

Now here in verse 10 it says:

"INDEED, YOU ARE DOING THE SAME FOR ALL THE BRETHREN IN THE WHOLE OF MACEDONIA."

It not only includes those who are in Thessalonica but for those who are in "THE WHOLE OF MACEDONIA," which would include Philippi and Berea.

I would imagine because Thessalonica is such a strategic seacoast town that the saints there had many opportunities to play host to other believers who were either there on business, pleasure or just passing through.

The reason that he knows they have been "taught by God" is because of their love for all of the brethren in the area of Macedonia.

Paul, however, is not going to be content with the love which is presently manifested but he is going to encourage and exhort these Christians to progress more and more in this love.

In <u>chapter 4:1</u> we saw him do the same thing with regard to their walk. They are walking to please God, but he also wants them to abound more and more in this walk; and so he is encouraging them to go on in their development and walk with the Lord.

Here he wants them to go on and abound in this love which God has given them.

Barnes says:

Here, as elsewhere, the apostle makes the fact that they deserved commendation for what they had done, a stimulus to arouse them to still higher attainments. p. 41

Hogg and Vine point out:

Early testimony to the presence of this fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22) among believers is on record in the statement of Tertullian:

The heathen often exclaimed in wonder, "See how these Christians love one another!"

And Lucian, himself a heathen, wrote about the same time:

It is incredible to see the fervor with which the people of that religion help each other in their wants. They spare nothing. Their first legislator [i.e., the Lord Jesus] has put it into their heads that they are all brethren.

Horne observes:

While the apostle acknowledges that the Thessalonians had indeed been expressing such love even to all the brethren in Macedonia, he feels that there is room for a further abounding. They should go on to ever new heights of love. From this we learn that as believers we must never be satisfied with our present spiritual attainments.

Lenski observes:

Thessalonica was a great seaport which carried on much trade with the entire province. Believers from the other Macedonian cities thus had cause to come to Thessalonica and there found the Thessalonian brethren full of true love for them, willing to lend them any assistance they needed.

Lange says:

True love never satisfies itself and would willingly be urged to ever higher performances.

LOVE'S MOTIVE AND REWARD

Christian philanthropist Fred Smith tells how his daughter Brenda and her husband Rick befriended an ex-convict and the woman with whom he was living. Rick gave the man a job. Brenda spent time with the woman, bought things for her, and witnessed to her about Christ. Together they convinced the couple that the right thing to do would be to get married. They even asked a minister to perform the ceremony and offered to open their home for the occasion. But a few days later, Rick found a note from the man saying that they were leaving town to get away from a hired assassin. Later, Mr. Smith asked his daughter how she felt about spending so much time, energy, and money on these people, only to have the relationship end so suddenly. Tears welled up in her eyes. "No matter where they are or how long they live," she said, "they'll always know that somebody cared." Brenda and Rick had loved unselfishly, and for them that was reward enough.

Some instructions come through brethren, other lessons are taught by God to His children directly; and here the apostle says, when it comes to the matter of love, they are to be commended but he wants them to do it more and more.

He wants to see persistence and consistency in their love.

Finally therefore, brethren, we are asking and exhorting you in the Lord Jesus, in order that, just as you received from us how you ought to walk and to please God (just as also you are walking), in order that you may abound more and more.

Now, brethren, we wish to make known to you the grace of God which has been given in the churches of Macedonia, that in a great ordeal of affliction their abundance of joy and their deep poverty overflowed in the wealth of their liberality. For I testify that according to their ability, and beyond their ability they gave of their own accord, begging us with much entreaty for the favor of participation in the support of the saints, and this, not as we had expected, but they first gave themselves to the Lord and to us by the will of God.

Many parishioners seem to wait for a reason to again affirm a pastor. Given that reason, they surprise their pastor with love and genuine forgiveness. Owens says, "When my people know I love them and am giving them the pastoral care they deserve, the mistakes I make don't mean as much. They say, 'Oh, he's a jackass, but he's our jackass!" p. 126

Paul's challenge here is that they are to grow in this love.

I love the way the Living Bible paraphrases:

1 John 4:17

As we live with Christ, our love grows more perfect and complete.

The more we get to know the Lord Jesus Christ, the greater is the capacity for love flowing through our lives.

His answer brings to memory the thrilling "Chambered Nautilus" of Oliver Wendell Holmes:

Build thee more stately mansions, O my soul,
As the swift seasons roll!
Leave thy low-vaulted past!
Let each new temple, nobler than the last,
Shut thee from heaven with a dome more vast,
Till thou at length art free,
Leaving thine outgrown shell by life's unresting sea!

Bobby Nichols explained it neatly in golf terms: "When you think you've got it in this game, that's when you've had it."

Sydney Harris wrote, "Education is not a mass of facts or inert ideas, as Whitehead called them, but an attitude and appetite and approach, a frame of mind, a function of the full personality, of the will, the spirit, and the imagination as much as of the intellectual force."

"I'm sure not what I was nor am I what I will be," he exclaimed. Not a bad definition of sanctification. A loving Father has His hand on the clay. We are holy people, we belong to Him, we are growing in holiness, being made like Him; and the best is still to come. We are becoming distinctly different people. Now we can say, "And every virtue we possess, and every victory won, and every thought of holiness, are His alone."

v.11 and to make it your ambition to live quietly and to busy yourselves with your own affairs and to work with your hands, even as we commanded you;

In this verse we find Paul's recipe for a WORTHY WALK.

1 Thessalonians 2:12

exhorting you, and encouraging [you] and bearing witness to the end that you should be walking in a manner worthy of the God who is calling you into His own kingdom and glory.

1 Thessalonians 4:1

Finally therefore, brethren, we are asking and exhorting you in the Lord Jesus, in order that, just as you received from us how you ought to walk and to please God (just as also you are walking), in order that you may abound more and more.

Now here in this <u>11th verse</u> we are going to get what is involved in Paul's estimation of a worthy walk.

With regard to those who are in the Christian community there is to be a manifestation of love; and as far as their own personal responsibility goes, they are to do the things that are contained here in verse 11.

The Bible Knowledge Commentary points out:

Everyday habits of living manifest love of the brethren as do more special demonstrations of affections. It is these habits that Paul suggested the Thessalonians ponder in the light of brotherly love. He suggested these goals as worthy objectives for their maturing love.

Paul is expecting that these 3 qualities that are mentioned in this verse will be a part and parcel of every Christian's experience.

Colossians 1:9, 10

For this reason also, since the day we heard of it, we have not ceased to pray for you and to ask that you may be filled with the knowledge of His will in all spiritual wisdom and understanding, so that you may walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, to please Him in all respects, bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;

2 Thessalonians 3:11

For we hear that some among you are leading an undisciplined life, doing no work at all, but acting like busybodies.

A. T. Robertson said:

It is amazing about how much wisdom people have about other people's affairs and so little interest in their own. There were pious idlers in the church in Thessalonica who were promoting trouble.

This is the KEY VERSE in our study:

Is Your Life a Witness?

It would be well for us to consider the 3-fold ambition that Paul has put down here for us and to weigh our own conduct and experience against what we see here. Then we can come to our own conclusions.

We will then be able to ascertain whether or not our lives are a real witness for Christ.

"AND TO MAKE IT YOUR AMBITION."

This Greek word is made up of 2 parts, meaning "love honor." It could be translated "to strive restlessly after."

The word occurs in 2 other PLACES in the New Testament:

1.Romans 15:20

And thus I aspired to preach the gospel, not where Christ was already named, that I might not build upon another man's foundation;

2.2 Corinthians 5:9

Therefore also we have as our ambition, whether at home or absent, to be pleasing to Him.

It is all right in the Christian life to strive for excellence, to love honor to the point of being motivated to make the necessary sacrifices to accomplish it.

Our passionate love for the Lord ought to fuel our purposes, resulting in a plan of action to achieve what He desires.

Horne says:

It seems that some of the believers had become so strongly convinced in their minds of the nearness of the Lord's return that they had become inwardly restless and outwardly idle. This led to meddlesomeness in the affairs of others. The idlers, ere long, being in want, asked support of the church. They were refused aid on the ground that they were able to support themselves. This whole affair disturbed the peace of the brotherhood. Paul therefore addresses himself to this problem.

OF MEN AND CUCKOOS

The European cuckoo bird is a "freeloader" in its very unusual nesting habits. When spring comes, it does not construct a home for its yearly brood. Instead, the female searches out an unsuspecting "foster home" and lays an egg in the nest of another such as the hedge sparrow. The cuckoo's offspring is left to be hatched and cared for by its "foster parent." While still featherless and blind, the intruder soon dominates the nest by pushing the rightful occupants over the edge to their death. Then it monopolizes all the attention of its new "parents."

Let us come to a consideration now of these 3 INGREDIENTS OF A WORTHY WALK:

- 1."TO LIVE QUIETLY"
- 2."TO BUSY YOURSELVES WITH YOUR OWN AFFAIRS"
- 3."TO WORK WITH YOUR HANDS, EVEN AS WE COMMANDED YOU"

Hendricksen points out:

Just the opposite of these characteristics would be fanatics, busybodies, and loafers. Nearly every church has them. Often one and the same person is all three. Hence, the three admonitions do not concern three separate classes of people but in a sense the entire congregation, for the seed of every sin is embedded in every heart.

The <u>1ST AMBITION</u> is:

1. "TO LIVE QUIETLY."

"TO LIVE QUIETLY" has nothing to do with the tongue but as <u>The Bible Knowledge</u> <u>Commentary</u> says:

Quiet means restful, less frantic.

1 Timothy 2:2

for kings and all who are in authority, in order that we may lead a tranquil and quiet life in all godliness and dignity.

Hebrews 4:1

Therefore, let us fear lest, while a promise remains of entering His rest, any one of you should seem to have come short of it.

Matthew 11:28-30

Come to Me, all who are weary and heavy-laden, and I will give you rest. Take My yoke upon you, and learn from Me, for I am gentle and humble in heart; and you shall find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy, and My load is light.

Ryrie says:

It means tranquility of mind, and this comes only when one's whole desire in life is to let Christ be magnified in his life. When selfish ambitions are the governing principles of life there can only be unrest, but when Christ completely controls there will be rest and the fulfillment of this admonition to be ambitious to have no ambition of one's own! pp. 59-60

Barnes, in commenting on this, says:

It is orderly, peaceful, living in the practice of the calm virtues of life. The duty to which he would exhort them was that of being subordinate to the laws, of avoiding all tumult and disorder, of calmly pursuing their regular avocations and of keeping themselves from all the assemblages of the idol, the restless and the dissatisfied.

Hendricksen says:

Some people had become restless. Paul now urges that this restlessness be turned into the proper channel. With that admirable ability to express himself paradoxically which again and again becomes evident in his epistles, Paul admonishes the Thessalonians to become all stirred up about being quiet, living calmly. Let the restless one be ambitious about attaining this goal.

Barnes says:

The Christian should live more inwardly than outwardly. The inner quietness will then show itself also in a quiet industrious life in which each man cares first for himself and those belonging to him before he will help others. This is not selfishness but fidelity in one's calling.

Ockenga says:

The teaching here is that we are to be content. This suggests peace, calm and happiness even in the midst of a throbbing, bustling and challenging day. Anyone who achieves such an existence knows that it must be sought, pursued and studied or it will never occur.

Stedman says:

In chapter 4:11 it says quite simply "to aspire to live quietly." That is to say, "You are not to live in a splurge. You are not to try to put on the dog. You are not to attempt to live out in the front of fashion, surpassing all your neighbors and friends."

Ellicott observes:

The very first publication of Christianity in Thessalonica seems to have been attended with some manifestations of restlessness and feverish expectation.

It would be good for us to stop and ask the question:

"What is the stuff that is stressing and worrying us?"

A young pastor, Dick Wilkenson, took an interest in us. He encouraged us to get a concordance and learn to use it. It would help us get biblical answers to our many questions, he said. We took his advice, which proved to be one of the most helpful moves we made to get to know what "pleasing God" meant.

It was he who introduced us to a biblical principle that disturbed us:

"Seek first the kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added to you." (Matthew 6:33, NKJV)

Up to this point in my life, my main preoccupation was in acquiring a home and the means to assure a comfortable, secure life. We had a new car, a new house, membership in a sailing club, a sailboat, access to a golf and tennis club. Even thinking about God was not a serious consideration. My pastor kept bringing up this verse and urging us to review our priorities.

Sunday was the best time for sailing and doing homework. (I was taking some engineering courses at night.) Golf or tennis took two or three evenings. Looking after the lawn, playing with the children, visiting our families took up time. It seemed our world consisted of pleasing ourselves.

TRAINING REQUIRES DILIGENCE

He kept asking us pesky questions in relation to that verse, such as: What are you doing with your time? What are you doing with your money? What are you studying in the Bible? Why weren't you in church on Sunday?

I had mixed feelings about him and his questions because I was embarrassed by the answers I had to give him.

Once, in exasperation, I told him to mind his own business. He said he was. As long as I came to his church, I was his business. He was my "coach."

Gradually, our focus changed from things to people. People appeared from nowhere asking for help with their problems, and we would invite them to come for dinner. We discovered that these dinner invitations were very expensive.

Besides, we had very little background for helping people.

We started going to church regularly on Sundays. Our sailboat, golf clubs, and tennis racquet got less and less use. pp. 211-212

(Topical Memory System: Life Issues. The Navigators)

Ponder the words of John Stott:

Contentment is the secret of inward peace. It remembers the stark truth that we brought nothing into the world and we can take nothing out of it. Life, in fact, is a pilgrimage from one moment of nakedness to another. So we should travel light and live simply. Our enemy is not possessions, but excess. Our battle cry is not "Nothing!" but "Enough!" We've got enough. Simplicity says, if we have food and clothing, we will be content with that.

There is no time for meddling. It is time to get busy on the task that has been assigned to you.

What Paul is saying here very simply is for each one to mind his own business and not to be so concerned about what the other man is doing. There are those who are not content unless they know every single detail about what is going on in someone else's life.

It is usually this type of person who likewise is the #1 GOSSIPER.

Hogg and Vine say:

The life of the Christian cannot be divided as into secular and sacred (cf. Col. 3:23, 24). The whole is to be lived for God always. Moreover, idlers neglecting their own easily become meddlers in other men's matters, literally, overseers of other's concerns (1 Pet. 4:15), and, not infrequently, indolent dependance on other men's bounty as well.

We can make a demonstration of our love for others by minding our own business.

Proverbs 25:17

Seldom set foot in your neighbor's house-too much of you, and he will hate you.

The <u>3RD AMBITION or INGREDIENT</u> for a worthy walk is:

3. "TO WORK WITH YOUR HANDS, EVEN AS WE COMMANDED YOU."

Paul in essence is saying, "Take it easy, no meddling and no idleness."

Needy idlers are not good Christians.

There is no room for laziness in the Christian life.

Each has a responsibility, each has a spiritual gift or gifts to make a contribution to the body of Christ.

Part of the problem in Thessalonica was that a number of the folks misunderstood the teaching with regard to the Lord's coming, and so, on the basis of his eminent return had refused to work while they waited for His coming.

Paul here clarifies this by making it clear to them that everyone is to work with his own hands and to be worthy of his hire.

When you find someone who is walking in intimate fellowship with the Lord, you usually find the following 3 THINGS:

1. URGENCY

<u>John 9:4</u>

We must work the works of Him who sent Me, as long as it is day; night is coming, when no man can work.

John 4:35, 36

Do you not say, "There are yet four months, and then comes the harvest"? Behold, I say to you, lift up your eyes, and look on the fields, that they are white for harvest. Already he who reaps is receiving wages, and is gathering fruit for life eternal; that he who sows and he who reaps may rejoice together.

2.THEY WANT TO RUN WELL

1 Corinthians 9:24

Do you not know that those who run in a race all run, but only one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may win.

Philippians 3:14

I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus.

3.A RESTLESS LONGING TO DO MORE

Philippians 2:17

But even if I am being poured out as a drink offering upon the sacrifice and service of your faith, I rejoice and share my joy with you all.

For you are remembering, brethren, our toil and hardship, night and day laboring that we might not be a burden to any of you, while we proclaimed to you the gospel of God.

The apostle concludes this verse with the words:

"EVEN AS WE COMMANDED YOU."

As part of the prescription for a worthy walk which he gave to them when he was in Thessalonica, these things were included. He is now just reminding them of it.

In essence, he says 3 THINGS:

- 1.sit down and shut up
- 2.mind your own business
- 3.do your job

Ecclesiastes 9:10

Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might, for in the grave, where you are going, there is neither working nor planning nor knowledge nor wisdom.

Colossians 3:23

Whatever you do, do your work heartily, as for the Lord rather than for men;

Barclay says:

Principal Rainy used to say, "Today I must lecture, tomorrow I must attend a committee meeting, on Sunday I must preach, someday I must die." Well then, let us do as well as we can each thing as it comes to us. The thought that Christ will someday come, that life as we know it will end is not a reason for stopping work. It is a reason for working all the harder and all the more faithfully. It is not hysterical and useless waiting but quiet and useful work which will be a man's passport to the kingdom.

HAPPY AT WORK

God created us to work, and the physical and emotional benefits are enormous. Perhaps that's why nearly 80 percent of wealthy people who wouldn't have to work, do so anyway.

As Christians, our attitude toward work is doubly important because it can either enhance or hinder our witness for Christ. When we are happy on the job, the task is easier and God is glorified. In his book <u>First Things First</u>, Roger C. Palms gave a personal example. While in college he worked one summer remodeling a bookstore. The heat and humidity were at their highest when his employer asked for someone to clean the furnace ducts. Palms volunteered. As he worked in the dust and soot, he began whistling to himself. Someone asked him the name of the song, so Palms recited the words of the hymn. A worker nearby overheard him and later asked a question that allowed him to give a positive witness for Christ. Had he been disgruntled with his job, Roger Palms probably wouldn't have whistled--or witnessed!

Walvoord says:

This business of sanctification, this call to holiness, extends to every aspect of our life. May God challenge us. We have been sanctified by the blood of Christ, by the power and presence of the Holy Spirit, by the purposes of God in our life in time and eternity. May we give ourselves to these things as the Holy Spirit speaks to our hearts.

Now it behooves each of us after having considered this recipe for a worthy walk to ask ourselves a question:

"Is our life a real witness?"

If we are tentative on our answers in this regard, what are the areas that need to be developed?

This is the purpose behind the 3-fold exhortation in verse 11:

"IN ORDER THAT YOU MAY BEHAVE DECENTLY TOWARD THOSE WHO ARE OUTSIDE."

To "BEHAVE DECENTLY" means:

"according to good fashion,"

or "in good form."

This is letting your light shine by:

LIVING QUIETLY,

BUSYING YOURSELF WITH YOUR OWN AFFAIRS,

and WORKING WITH YOUR HANDS.

This is STAYING BY THE STUFF and living it one day at a time.

Ellicott says:

They were not by the neglect of their proper occupations to live dependent upon others, whether heathens, or more probably fellow Christians.

The Bible Knowledge Commentary says:

They were to be self-supporting so they were not a burden.

Horne says:

The Christian must always keep in mind the impact which his behavior will have on those who are unsaved. When some did not work at all but lived on the charity of others, spending their time in idle gossip, what would outsiders think? This would be a sure way to bring the church into disrepute. The believer is to be careful to maintain a blameless testimony before the world in every area of his conduct, whether business, domestic, political, social, religious or private.

The point that the apostle is making is that the Christian must not become a parasite. Love of the brethren is not compatible with such irresponsible behavior.

Jesus began in Matthew 5 by giving us the Beatitudes, which are attitudes that characterize people who enter the kingdom of heaven. Those who are beatitude people will be salt and light in a rotten and dark world because their faith will be based on a relationship rather than rules. As they enter deeper into that relationship with God, they will come to understand the truth. To help them understand the truth, Jesus gave six case studies--murder and anger, adultery and lust, divorce and selfishness, oaths and deceit, retaliation and rights, hate and love. In all these cases, Jesus set forth principles that flow from inner righteousness.

Now Paul is going to give us the PURPOSE for walking the way he has described in verse 11. It is "IN ORDER THAT":

The 2ND THING he is going to say in this verse is:

2."AND YOU MAY NOT BE HAVING NEED OF ANYTHING."

Let us first consider our responsibility toward the unsaved as far as our conduct is concerned.
