STUDY NUMBER NINETEEN - HEBREWS 11:1-22
The wonderful thing about studying the book of Hebrews is that the book of Hebrews is a book that magnifies the person of the Lord Jesus Christ.

As you begin in chapter 1 you are meeting people who want to leave Christianity for Judaism.
The reason they do is many of them have lost their homes, they have been persecuted, they have had difficulty ever since they made their confession of faith.

So what they are saying in essence is, "I would like to go back under Judaism it's lot more comfortable, I am going to be accepted by my family and everything is going to be a whole lot easier.

The writer to the book of Hebrews, with Holy passion wants them to understand there are serious consequences to that.

wants them to understand there are serious consequences to that.

You can't go back and live under Judaism without very very serious things happening.

And one of those things is, you are trying to destroy a relationship that is permanent. In other words

THERE ARE NO REWIND BUTTONS ON
THE VCR OF LIFE

Although we would like it to be that way.

You can't all of the sudden destroy a relationship as though it never existed.

And they are thinking of going back under Judaism and the writer makes this powerful plea.

We have learned in this study the fact that each of us must have someone represent us before God.

We cannot expect that on our own we would be accepted in God's presence.

Now the Aaronic priesthood was set up for that purpose: to represent the people before God.

But when Christ died upon the cross and the veil was ripped from top to bottom the Aaronic priesthood was nullified and finished.

Now there is a new priest and this new priest

Now there is a new priest and this new priest is the Lord Jesus Christ.

There is one God and one mediator. 1 Timothy 2:5.

And so we have a new:

PRIEST,

COVENANT, and

SACRIFICE

and that's Hebrews 7:8, 9.

Don't take the easy way out.
Keep trusting God and be obedient to His word."

He says, "You all are having it rough, you are getting ready to quit, you are discouraged.

You want to leave Christ and go back to Judaism.

Let me tell you something, your name will never be in the hall of faith if you don't stay in there and keep going."

Hebrews 11 is what we call the great Hall of Faith.

It is the story of folks who moved forward and nothing stopped them.

Now when we look at the first three verses of Hebrews 11 we are talking about what faith does, we are not talking about what faith is.

How will you see faith? When you see it manifested, what are its characteristics? What does it do?

You see the big thing today, that's going to bless you and why Hebrews 11 is so great is because it's people who are coming up alongside of you and all they had was, the promises of God but they made it. And that brings inspiration.

Now faith without works is dead, when faith is alive it will manifest itself in certain ways.

The way this is divided today, we will look at the first three verses, and it tells us what faith does, and then we are going to see eight biographies.

v. 1 Now faith is the realization of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

There are two things that you can say when you see faith. The person who is exercising faith has:

1. "THE REALIZATION OF THINGS HOPED FOR'

and

2. "THE CONVICTION OF THINGS NOT SEEN."

In fact it is so real that he is already realizing what he hopes for which is life after death – eternal salvation through coming to know the person of Christ.

It's "the realization of things hoped for" but it's "the conviction of things not seen."

It is knowing in your heart of hearts there is an unseen world.

Now can I say a few things about what faith isn't?

Faith is NOT positive thinking.

Some people equate faith to positive thinking.

That is not faith.

Faith is NOT a hunch.
I have a hunch this might be okay so I'm going to put some faith in that.

Faith is NOT hoping for the best.

Faith is not just sitting here just hoping that it's really going work and everything is going to be fine. going work and everything is going to be fine.

And faith is NOT a feeling of optimism. In other words I know if I just keep being optimistic, everything is going to turn out wonderful and so we equate faith to optimism.

Can I share what faith really is?

FAITH IS EXERCISED WHEN WE ARE PERSEVERINGED.

AND HANGING ON TO THE PROMISES WHEN THERE IS NO EVIDENCES OF GOD'S INTERVENTION IN OUR LIFE AND CIRCUMSTANCES.

You see, the greatest demonstration of faith is not when everything is going great for you.

The greatest demonstration of faith is your hanging on to the promises when God has some greater purpose that you don't understand. And you're having a tremendous testimony to the authenticity of the promises of God by the fact that you're hanging on to them by faith.

Every one of these characters in Hebrews 11 are going to show that to you in bold relief today, of how beautiful faith is demonstrated in their lives.

V. 2 For by it the men of old gained approval.

They were men who walked with God and they trusted Him.

Remember Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego.

Here they are confronted with the fiery furnace, listen to them talk with faith talk?

They said as they came before King Nebuchadnezzar, "If we are thrown into the blazing furnace, the God we serve is able to save us from it, and he will rescue us from your hand, O king.

[But get this.] But even if he does not, we want you to know, O king, that we will not serve your gods or worship the image of gold you have set up." know, O king, that we will not serve your gods or worship the image of gold you have set up."

And so God is going to come through whether or not it's in the fiery furnace.

To my way of thinking it is when God does not come through for you because of some different program or greater purpose involved, that we have a true picture of faith.

You realize it does get kind of confusing and messed up out there sometimes when you try to put all that stuff together.

You have evidences all around you, of the hand of God in putting this marvelous thing together.

So faith sees creation as evidence of the existence of God and the promises which he makes, which we hang on to in the midst of life's adversities.

They are going to be quick little snapshots They are going to be quick little snapshots but they are going to teach us a whole lot about faith. So we move from principles to people,

These 8 people we are going to look at, I call them the BF's and the AF's.

That's before the flood and after the flood.

You have 3 before and 5 after in the stories.

Each of them are there for a special reason and they have a message that's powerful for us to get a hold of one of the stories.

v. 4 By faith Abel offered to God a better sacrifice than Cain, through which he obtained the testimony that he was righteous, God testifying about his gifts, and through faith, though he is dead, he still is speaking.

The first guy that we have is the younger son of Adam and Eve.

They have Cain and then they have Abel.

The time comes for worship and the two boys come with different sacrifices.

God made it clear what he wanted but Cain didn't pay attention.

He thought God would be very appreciative of the sacrifices of the toil of his own labor so he brings the fruit of the ground.

And Abel brings the sacrifice.

Then Cain gets ticked because his sacrifice is rejected.

Then Cain gets ticked because his sacrifice is rejected. So that may prove difficult to what the Lord says in Genesis 4.

Then the Lord said to Cain, "Why are you angry? Why is your face downcast? If you do what is right, will you not be accepted? But if you do not do what is right, sin is crouching at your door; it desires to have you, but you must master it.

You must do what is right, in the face of opposition or recognize what you want, as opposed to what God wants, you must do what God wants, if you would be accepted.

"BY FAITH ABEL OFFERED TO GOD A BETTER SACRIFICE THAN CAIN"

Here is Abel, he does what is right.

And then the last phrase in the verse says, "and through faith, though he is dead, he still is speaking."

Now what does that mean?

How is Abel speaking to you today?

Well here are three things.

The legacy of a man like Abel in the Hall of Faith as the first guy, there are three things we need to remember

- 1. You have to come to God by faith.
- 2. You have to come to God his prescribed way, you can't come your own way.
- 3. And third you can come the wrong way and it will lead to rejection on the part of God.

Now isn't that what Jesus said when He gave His first message on the <u>Sermon on the Mount</u>.

"Many will say unto me on that day Lord, Lord haven't we done many wonderful works and I will say depart from me I never knew you, you workers of iniquity."

So here in the very first person in the Hall of Faith you have the same statements and warnings given through Abel and the legacy that he leaves behind, as Jesus in His first message that He preaches publicly.

It's to warn people that God means business and you come on His terms and in His way if you are going to enjoy fulfillment in life.

v. 5 By faith Enoch was taken up so that he should not see death; and he was not found because God took him up; for he had witness borne that before his being taken up he was pleasing to God.

You have FAITH WORSHIPPING in Abel but you have FAITH WALKING in Enoch.

Here is a man who walked with God and the walk was so wonderful that one day God took him up and he didn't even see death "for he had witness borne that before his being taken up he was pleasing to God."

What was it about Enoch that made him so unique?

Do you remember how long this guy lived? 365 years!

After living a selfish, indulgent life for 65 years he and his wife had a little boy by the name of Methuselah and that changed his life and for 300 years he walked with God.

You might be sitting here today the very same way and you look back on your life and you remember the birth of your first child and how it changed your life and was your life and you remember as your life and your life as you held that miracle of life in your hands.

For many folks, they can give testimony to that.

To Enoch that was the turning point in his life. His little boy was born and for 300 years he walks with God.

Now what is the primary focus in your life today? What is the most important thing to you today? If you say anything other than your walk with God you may want to revaluate your priorities.

If you have not had time with the Lord today or

this week, you have wasted some special days. A relationship will not continue when there is constant neglect. Give examples; marriage, etc.

It will only be deepened and developed through relationship and you know that takes time.

The one thing God created you for was for a relationship.

He doesn't want a performance from you.

And out of that relationship comes all the joy and the blessing in your life.

There are numerous illustrations through all of Scripture to help us understand – GOD WANTS YOUR HEART.

And with your heart comes the deepening of the relationship because that's the most important thing in your life.

Elijah went up didn't he without seeing death.

So there's nothing foreign in what has happened to Enoch.

Back to verse 5, now notice the REASON. Look at the next phrase,

v. 16 But as it is, they are longing for a better [home], that is a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; for [what?] He prepared a city for them.

What else do we learn from Abraham besides waiting We learn that when we exercise faith in the Lord Jesus we can expect to be having our faith tested.

And that's the explanation for suffering in our lives as believers a lot of times.

God is refining our faith and testing the validity of it.

He teaches us faith and then He puts us in the storm to see whether we pass the test.

When faith is tested in suffering it's not because God is mad at you or because you have done something wrong.

He is building the virility and the vitality of your faith by what you are going through in the circumstance so that you can be joyful if such is the case.

Isaiah 48:10, 11

See, I have refined you, though not as silver; I have tested you in the furnace of affliction. For my own sake, for my own sake, I do this. How can I let myself be defamed?

1 Peter 1:6, 7

In this you greatly rejoice, even though now for a little while, if necessary, you have been distressed by various trials, that the proof of your faith, being more precious than gold which is perishable, even though tested by fire.

God tests faith.

- v. 18 with reference to whom it was said, "In Isaac your descendants shall be called."
- v. 19 He considered that God is able to raise [men] even from the dead; from which he also received him back as a type.

Do you remember what Abraham said in <u>Genesis 22</u>,? When he got ready to go up and sacrifice he said,

"I and the lad will go yonder and we will return to you

In other words, if I put the knife in him up there and he dies there's going to be a resurrection because he promised descendants.

God has already made that clear. So he still trusts God. He considered that God was able to raise him from the dead.

- v. 20 By faith Isaac blessed Jacob and Esau, even concerning things about to be coming.
- v. 21 By faith Jacob, as he was dying, blessed each of the sons of Joseph, and worshiped, [leaning] on the top of his staff.

Here's Jacob in old age.

And as he's leaning on the top of his staff and he blesses his family.

What does it tell you when you look at guys like this down at the end of their lives?

The strength of their faith at the end of their lives is unabated as they face the future.

It's the apostle Paul saying in 2 Timothy Chapter 4 just before he puts down the pen of inspiration, I've fought a good fight, I've finished the course, I've kept the faith.

There it is.

He's a finisher.

v. 22 By faith Joseph, when coming near to the end of his life, made mention of the exodus of the sons of Israel, and gave orders concerning his bones.

STUDIES IN THE EPISTLE TO THE HEBREWS PART III

STUDY NUMBER NINETEEN — Hebrews 11:1-22

- v. 1 Now faith is the realization of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.
- v. 2 For by it the men of old gained approval.
- <u>v. 3</u> By faith we are understanding that the worlds have been prepared by the word of God, so that which we are seeing has not come into being out of things which are visible.
- <u>v. 4</u> By faith Abel offered to God a better sacrifice than Cain, through which he obtained the testimony that he was righteous, God testifying about his gifts, and through faith, though he is dead, he still is speaking.
- v. 5 By faith Enoch was taken up so that he should not see death; and he was not found because God took him up; for he had witness borne that before his being taken up he was pleasing to God.
- <u>v. 6</u> And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who is coming to God must believe that He is, and that He proves Himself a rewarder of those who are seeking Him.
- <u>v. 7</u> By faith Noah, being warned [by God] about things not yet seen, in reverence prepared an ark for the salvation of his household by which he condemned the world and became an heir of the righteousness which is according to faith.
- <u>v. 8</u> By faith Abraham, obeyed by going out to a place which he was about to be receiving for an inheritance; and he went out, not knowing where he was going.
- v. 9 By faith he lived as a stranger in the land of promise, as if it were foreign, dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, fellow heirs of the same promise;
- <u>v.10</u> for he was looking for the city having foundations, whose architect and builder is God.
- <u>v.11</u> By faith even Sarah herself received power to conceive a child, even beyond the normal time of life, since she considered Him faithful who promised;
- <u>v.12</u> therefore, also, there was born of one man, and him as good as dead at that, [as many descendants] as the stars of heaven in number, and innumerable as the sand which is by the seashore.
- <u>v.13</u> All these died in faith, not having received the promises, but having seen them and having welcomed them from a distance, and having confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth.
- <u>v.14</u> For those who are saying such things are making it clear that they are seeking a country of their own.
- $\underline{v.15}$ And indeed if they had been thinking of that country from which they went out, they would have had opportunity to return.
- <u>v.16</u> But as it is, they are longing for a better [home], that is a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; for He prepared a city for them.
- <u>v.17</u> By faith Abraham, while being put to the test, offered up Isaac; and he who received the promises was offering up his only begotten [son];
- v.18 with reference to whom it was said, "In Isaac your descendants shall be called."
- <u>v.19</u> He considered that God is able to raise [men] even from the dead; from which he also received him back as a type.
- <u>v.20</u> By faith Isaac blessed Jacob and Esau, even concerning things about to be coming.
- <u>v.21</u> By faith Jacob, as he was dying, blessed each of the sons of Joseph, and worshiped, [leaning] on the top of his staff.
- v.22 By faith Joseph, when coming near to the end of his life, made mention of the exodus of the sons of Israel, and gave orders concerning his bones.
