STUDY NUMBER ONE - PSALM 1:1-6

NOTES

- v. 1 Blessed is the man who does not walk in the counsel of the wicked or stand in the way of sinners or sit in the seat of mockers.
- <u>v. 2</u> But his delight is in the law of the Lord, and on his law he meditates day and night.
- <u>v. 3</u> He is like a tree planted by streams of water, which yields its fruit in season and whose leaf does not wither. Whatever he does prospers.
- v. 4 Not so the wicked! They are like chaff that the wind blows away.
- \underline{v} . 5 Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the assembly of the righteous.
- v. 6 For the Lord watches over the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish.

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: The happy man does not "walk in the counsel of the wicked," "stand in the way of sinners," or "sit in the seat of mockers."

- LESSON #2: "The plans of the righteous are just, but the advice of the wicked is deceitful" (Proverbs 12:5).
- LESSON #3: The righteous man flees the way of sinners and follows after righteousness, godliness, faith, love, perseverance, and gentleness.
- LESSON #4: The Lord "mocks proud mockers but gives grace to the humble" (Proverbs 3:34).
- LESSON #5: The happy man finds "his delight in the law of the Lord."
- LESSON #6: "Your words were found and I ate them; and Your words were to me a joy and the rejoicing of my heart; for I am called by Your name, O Lord God of hosts" (Jeremiah 15:16 TAB).
- LESSON #7: The happy man meditates on the words of God day and night.
- LESSON #8: The happy man is like a tree, planted in the most ideal place, yielding fruit in season, his leaf stays green and whatever he does prospers.
- LESSON #9: The wicked are like chaff that are literally blown away.
- LESSON #10: The wicked will not have a leg to stand on in the day of judgment.
- LESSON #11: The Lord watches over the way of the righteous.
- LESSON #12: "The way of the wicked will perish."

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STUDY NUMBER TWO - PSALM 8:1-9

- <u>v. 1</u> O Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! You have set your glory above the heavens.
- <u>v. 2</u> From the lips of children and infants you have ordained praise because of your enemies, to silence the foe and the avenger.
- <u>v. 3</u> When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place,
- <u>v. 4</u> what is man that you are mindful of him, the son of man that you care for him?
- v. 5 You made him a little lower than the heavenly beings and crowned him with glory and honor.

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 $\underline{\text{v. 6}}$ You made him ruler over the works of your hands; you put everything under his feet:

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What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: It brings delight to the heart of God when His children praise Him.

LESSON #2: Lord, You have covered the heavens with Your glory!

- LESSON #3: Lord, thank You for the joy of knowing that it is out of the mouths of infants and nursing babes that You have prepared praise for Yourself.
- LESSON #4: Lord, there is great fulfillment in the acknowledgment of the fact that You are the Creator and the Sustainer of this great universe.
- LESSON #5: Lord, because of Your greatness, it is hard for us to comprehend that You are mindful of us and You care for us.
- LESSON #6: The Lord is mindful of us and He does care for us.
- LESSON #7: Lord, thank You for creating us the way You did—a little less than divine and crowning us with "glory and honor."
- LESSON #8: Lord, thank You for putting us in charge of Your hand-crafted world.
- LESSON #9: Lord, hasten the day when creation will be set free from the curse of corruption and You will reign as King of kings and Lord of lords.
- LESSON #10: "Therefore also God highly exalted him, and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of those who are in heaven, and on the earth, and under the earth, and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:9-11).

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What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: Time seems to go so slow when we are in the furnace of affliction.

LESSON #2: God is never in a hurry when He is working out His purpose and plan in our lives.

LESSON #3: We are very precious to the Lord and He will never forget us.

LESSON #4: "Many are the plans in a man's heart, but it is the Lord's purpose that prevails" (Proverbs 19:21).

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- LESSON #5: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways,' declares the Lord. 'As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts" (Isaiah 55:8, 9).
- LESSON #6: Perhaps we not only need to ask the Lord to look on us, but to ask the Lord to give us a fresh vision of who He is and what He can do.
- LESSON #7: "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed, because his compassions fail not. They are new every morning: great is thy faithfulness (<u>Lamentations 3:22, 23 KJV</u>).

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- <u>v. 1</u> Lord, who may dwell in your sanctuary? Who may live on your holy hill?
- $\underline{\text{v. 2}}$ He whose walk is blameless and who does what is righteous, who speaks the truth from his heart
- v. 3 and has no slander on his tongue, who does his neighbor no wrong and casts no slur on his fellowman,
- <u>v. 4</u> who despises a vile man but honors those who fear the Lord, who keeps his oath even when it hurts,
- <u>v. 5</u> who lends his money without usury and does not accept a bribe against the innocent. He who does these things will never be shaken.

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What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

- LESSON #1: Have you made your reservations for the marriage supper of the Lamb by inviting the Lord Jesus to come into your heart and become your Savior?
- LESSON #2: Is your "walk blameless," your work "righteous," and your words "truth from your heart?"
- LESSON #3: A person with a critical spirit is walking in the flesh rather than in the power of the Spirit.
- LESSON #4: The Christian army is the only army where you have to wear your armor to protect yourself from your friends.
- LESSON #5: Your walk is far more important than your talk.
- LESSON #6: "But like the Holy One who called you, be holy yourselves also in all your behavior; because it is written, 'You shall be holy, for I am holy'" (1 Peter 1:15, 16).
- LESSON #7: "[Let your] love be sincere—a real thing; hate what is evil (loathe all ungodliness, turn in horror from wickedness), but hold fast to that which is good" (Romans 12:9 Amplified).
- LESSON #8: Remember, a godly person "keeps his oath even when it hurts."
- LESSON #9: Are you being a blessing to others with the funds that the Lord has allowed you to have?
- LESSON #10: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, knowing that your [labor] is not in vain in the Lord" (1 Corinthians 15:58).

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STUDY NUMBER FIVE - PSALM 19:1-14

<u>v. 1</u> The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands.

- v. 2 Day after day they pour forth speech; night after night they display knowledge.
- v. 3 There is no speech or language where their voice is not heard.
- <u>v. 4</u> Their voice goes out into all the earth, their words to the ends of the world. In the heavens he has pitched a tent for the sun,
- <u>v. 5</u> which is like a bridegroom coming forth from his pavilion, like a champion rejoicing to run his course.
- <u>v. 6</u> It rises at one end of the heavens and makes its circuit to the other; nothing is hidden from its heat.
- <u>v. 7</u> The law of the Lord is perfect, reviving the soul. The statutes of the Lord are trustworthy, making wise the simple.
- <u>v. 8</u> The precepts of the Lord are right, giving joy to the heart. The commands of the Lord are radiant, giving light to the eyes.
- <u>v. 9</u> The fear of the Lord is pure, enduring forever. The ordinances of the Lord are sure and altogether righteous.
- <u>v. 10</u> They are more precious than gold, than much pure gold; they are sweeter than honey, than honey from the comb.
- v. 11 By them is your servant warned; in keeping them there is great reward.
- v. 12 Who can discern his errors? Forgive my hidden faults.
- v. 13 Keep your servant also from willful sins; may they not rule over me.

Then will I be blameless, innocent of great transgression.

v. 14 May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight, O Lord, my Rock and my Redeemer.

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: "The heavens declare the glory of God" but not His will.

LESSON #2: A continuous message is going forth from creation. God designed it that way.

LESSON #3: We are exalting the Creator when we magnify His creation.

LESSON #4: Creation proclaims "the glory of God."

LESSON #5: The order and design of creation points to the indisputable evidence of a Creator.

- LESSON #6: The Word of God was given for the purpose of "reviving the soul," "making wise the simple," "giving joy to the heart," "giving light to the eyes," to be "enduring forever," and "altogether righteous."
- LESSON #7: The Word of God is "perfect," "trustworthy," "right," "radiant," "pure," and "sure."
- LESSON #8: The Word of God is "more precious than gold" and "sweeter than honey."
- LESSON #9: The Word is God is a mirror for us to see those areas of our lives where we are living in denial and using rationalization.
- LESSON #10: God gives token of His pleasure in response to our obedience.
- LESSON #11: Lord, "may the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart be pleasing in your sight."
- LESSON #12: Thank You Lord, that You are "my Rock and my Redeemer."

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STUDY NUMBER SIX - PSALM 22:1-31

- <u>v. 1</u> My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from the words of my groaning?
- <u>v. 2</u> O my God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night, and am not silent.
- v. 3 Yet you are enthroned as the Holy One; you are the praise of Israel.
- v. 4 In you our fathers put their trust; they trusted and you delivered them.
- <u>v. 5</u> They cried to you and were saved; in you they trusted and were not disappointed.
- <u>v. 6</u> But I am a worm and not a man, scorned by men and despised by the people.
- v. 7 All who see me mock me; they hurl insults, shaking their heads:
- <u>v. 8</u> "He trusts in the Lord; let the Lord rescue him. Let him deliver him, since he delights in him."
- \underline{v} . 9 Yet you brought me out of the womb; you made me trust in you even at my mother's breast.
- v. 10 From birth I was cast upon you; from my mother's womb you have been my God.
- v. 11 Do not be far from me, for trouble is near and there is no one to help.
- v. 12 Many bulls surround me; strong bulls of Bashan encircle me.

v. 13 Roaring lions tearing their prey open their mouths wide against me.

- v. 14 I am poured out like water, and all my bones are out of joint. My heart has turned to wax; it has melted away within me.
- $\underline{v. 15}$ My strength is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue sticks to the roof of my mouth; you lay me in the dust of death.
- v. 16 Dogs have surrounded me; a band of evil men has encircled me, they have pierced my hands and my feet.
- v. 17 I can count all my bones; people stare and gloat over me.
- v. 18 They divide my garments among them and cast lots for my clothing.
- v. 19 But you, O Lord, be not far off; O my Strength, come quickly to help me.
- $\underline{v.~20}$ Deliver my life from the sword, my precious life from the power of the dogs.
- v. 21 Rescue me from the mouth of the lions; save me from the horns of the wild oxen.
- v. 22 I will declare your name to my brothers; in the congregation I will praise you.
- v. 23 You who fear the Lord, praise him! All you descendants of Jacob, honor him! Revere him, all you descendants of Israel!
- <u>v. 24</u> For he has not despised or disdained the suffering of the afflicted one; he has not hidden his face from him but has listened to his cry for help.
- v. 25 From you comes the theme of my praise in the great assembly; before those who fear you will I fulfill my vows.
- v. 26 The poor will eat and be satisfied; they who seek the Lord will praise him—may your hearts live forever!
- <u>v. 27</u> All the ends of the earth will remember and turn to the Lord, and all the families of the nations will bow down before him,
- v. 28 for dominion belongs to the Lord and he rules over the nations.
- <u>v. 29</u> All the rich of the earth will feast and worship; all who go down to the dust will kneel before him—those who cannot keep themselves alive.
- v. 30 Posterity will serve him; future generations will be told about the Lord.
- <u>v. 31</u> They will proclaim his righteousness to a people yet unborn—for he has done it.

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

- LESSON #1: There is no greater passage to teach us the principle of literal fulfillment of Bible prophecy than this one.
- LESSON #2: The Lord Jesus Christ was forsaken by God the Father when He was made sin for us so that we would never have to experience being forsaken.

- LESSON #3: In His moment of greatest humiliation, the Lord Jesus Christ says, "I am a worm, not a man, scorned by men and despised by the people."
- LESSON #4: While men are mocking and hurling insults and shaking their heads at Jesus, He is praying, "Father, forgive them for they are not knowing what they are doing."
- LESSON #5: I think it helps us to realize the miracle of what we are reading when we recognize these words were written a thousand years ahead of time.
- LESSON #6: Jesus probably recited this whole psalm during the hours that He was hanging on the cross.
- LESSON #7: Crucifixion was unknown until the time of the Roman empire and these words, "they pierced my hands and my feet," are once again miraculous.
- LESSON #8: They were announcing His death ahead of time by "dividing His garments among them and casting lots for his clothing."
- LESSON #9: Lord, help me to praise You, to honor You, and to revere You.
- LESSON #10: Lord, thank You that our Savior did not stay in the grave but He has broken the bands of death and now is the ever-living Son of God.
- LESSON #11: Lord, You are the theme of my praise.

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LESSON #12: Lord, thank You the dominion belongs to You and that You rule over the nations.

STUDY NUMBER SEVEN - PSALM 23:1-6

NOTES

- v. 1 The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want.
- <u>v. 2</u> He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters,
- <u>v. 3</u> he restores my soul. He guides me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake.
- v. 4 Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.
- \underline{v} . 5 You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.
- <u>v. 6</u> Surely goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever.

LESSON #1: "The Lord is my shepherd" not "was" or "shall be."

LESSON #2: The Lord is personally and intimately involved in the lives of His sheep.

- LESSON #3: Because "the Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want."
- LESSON #4: The top three items on the Shepherd's agenda are rest, restoration, and regulation.
- LESSON #5: The good Shepherd with tender care imparts sweet repose to His weary sheep.
- LESSON #6: I do not want because "he makes me lie down in green pastures, he [gently] leads me beside [restful] waters, he [refreshes] my soul," and he regulates me in "righteous" tracks.
- LESSON #7: The Lord's presence casts out the fear of physical death because He has already been there ahead of us and done that.
- LESSON #8: My Shepherd is there to "prepare a table," to "anoint my head," and to give me a "cup" overflowing.
- LESSON #9: I do not fear because "you are with me," "your rod and your staff comfort me," you arrange "a table before me," and you anointed the head of me.
- LESSON #10: I am content, my cup is fullness, good fortune and grace shall pursue me, and "I will dwell in the house of the Lord forever."

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STUDY NUMBER EIGHT - PSALM 27:1-14

- $\underline{\text{v. 1}}$ The Lord is my light and my salvation—whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life—of whom shall I be afraid?
- $\underline{\text{v. 2}}$ When evil men advance against me to devour my flesh, when my enemies and my foes attack me, they will stumble and fall.
- <u>v. 3</u> Though an army besiege me, my heart will not fear; though war break out against me, even then will I be confident.
- <u>v. 4</u> One thing I ask of the Lord, this is what I seek: that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life, to gaze upon the beauty of the Lord and to seek him in his temple.
- <u>v. 5</u> For in the day of trouble he will keep me safe in his dwelling; he will hide me in the shelter of his tabernacle and set me high upon a rock.
- <u>v. 6</u> Then my head will be exalted above the enemies who surround me; at his tabernacle will I sacrifice with shouts of joy; I will sing and make music to the Lord.
- $\underline{\text{v. 7}}$ Hear my voice when I call, O Lord; be merciful to me and answer me.

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v. 8 My heart says of you, "Seek his face!" Your face, Lord, I will seek.
 v. 9 Do not hide your face from me, do not turn your servant away in anger; you have been my helper. Do not reject me or forsake me, O God my Savior

v. 10 Though my father and mother forsake me, the Lord will receive me. v. 11 Teach me your way, O Lord; lead me in a straight path because of my oppressors.

v. 12 Do not turn me over to the desire of my foes, for false witnesses rise up against me, breathing out violence.

v. 13 I am still confident of this: I will see the goodness of the Lord in the land of the living.

v. 14 Wait for the Lord; be strong and take heart and wait for the Lord.

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: The normal Christian life is filled with peaks and valleys.

LESSON #2: Is the Lord your "light," your "salvation," and your "stronghold"?

LESSON #3: Of what and of whom are you afraid?

LESSON #4: The battle is the Lord's and He will facilitate the victory if we will but trust in Him.

- LESSON #5: Do you have that quiet confidence that God is working all these things out even if you do not understand?
- LESSON #6: Can you, with David, say: "One thing I ask" and with the apostle Paul: "This one thing I do"?

STUDY NUMBER ELEVEN - PSALM 37:1-40

- $\underline{\text{v. 1}}$ Do not fret because of evil men or be envious of those who do wrong;
- <u>v. 2</u> for like the grass they will soon wither, like green plants they will soon die away.
- v. 3 Trust in the Lord and do good; dwell in the land and enjoy safe pasture.
- v. 4 Delight yourself in the Lord and he will give you the desires of your heart.

STUDY NUMBER TWELVE - PSALM 40:1-17

- v. 1 I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry.
- v. 2 He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire; he set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand.
- v. 3 He put a new song in my mouth, a hymn of praise to our God. Many will see and fear and put their trust in the Lord.
- <u>v. 4</u> Blessed is the man who makes the Lord his trust, who does not look to the proud, to those who turn aside to false gods.

LESSON #4: David has experienced an incredible answer to prayer.

LESSON #5: The answer to prayer has made him "bold and stouthearted" (verse 3).

LESSON #6: His wish is that the impact of what the Lord has done for him will affect the "kings of the earth" so that they, too, enter into a chorus of praise to the Lord (verse 4).

LESSON #7: Although the "glory of the Lord is great," "he looks [with concern] upon the lowly" (verses 5 & 6).

LESSON #8: The Lord does not have a relationship with the "proud" (verse 6).

LESSON #9: Lord, it is wonderful to know that in the "midst of trouble," You are there with us (verse 7).

LESSON #10: What a joy is ours to know that You will "fulfill Your purpose" for us (verse 8).

LESSON #11: You will "not abandon the works of your hands" (verse 8).

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STUDY NUMBER TWENTY-TWO - PSALM 139:1-24

<u>Notes</u>

- v. 1 O Lord, you have searched me and you know me.
- <u>v. 2</u> You know when I sit and when I rise; you perceive my thoughts from afar.
- v. 3 You discern my going out and my lying down; you are familiar with all my ways.
- v. 4 Before a word is on my tongue you know it completely, O Lord.
- v. 5 You hem me in—behind and before; you have laid your hand upon me.
- v. 6 Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too lofty for me to attain.
- v. 7 Where can I go from your Spirit? Where can I flee from your presence?
- <u>v. 8</u> If I go up to the heavens, you are there; if I make my bed in the depths, you are there.
- v. 9 If I rise on the wings of the dawn, if I settle on the far side of the sea,
- v. 10 even there your hand will guide me, your right hand will hold me fast.
- v. 11 If I say, "Surely the darkness will hide me and the light become night around me,"
- v. 12 even the darkness will not be dark to you; the night will shine like the day, for darkness is as light to you.
- <u>v. 13</u> For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb.
- v. 14 I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.
- <u>v. 15</u> My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place. When I was woven together in the depths of the earth,
- <u>v. 16</u> your eyes saw my unformed body. All the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be.
- <u>v. 17</u> How precious to me are your thoughts, O God! How vast is the sum of them!
- v. 18 Were I to count them, they would outnumber the grains of sand. When I awake, I am still with you.
- $\underline{\text{v. }19}$ If only you would slay the wicked, O God! Away from me, you bloodthirsty men!

v. 20 They speak of you with evil intent; your adversaries misuse your name.

v. 21 Do I not hate those who hate you, O Lord, and abhor those who rise up against you?

v. 22 I have nothing but hatred for them; I count them my enemies.

v. 23 Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts.

<u>v. 24</u> See if there is any offensive way in me, and lead me in the way everlasting.

What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: The Lord knows everything about us and He still loves us unconditionally.

LESSON #2: We are under the Lord's constant surveillance.

LESSON #3: The Lord is fully aware of what our words will be even before they are spoken.

LESSON #4: Can we say with the Psalmist, "Such knowledge is too wonderful for me, too lofty for me to attain"? (verse 6).

LESSON #5: What a comfort to know that the Lord is with us all the time.

LESSON #6: No matter where I go, He is there.

LESSON #7: "I praise You [Lord] because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well" (verse 14).

LESSON #8: Lord, thank You that there are no limitations upon Your power.

LESSON #9: "How precious to me are your thoughts, O God! How vast is the sum of them!" (verse 17).

LESSON #10: Lord, the prayer of my heart is that of David: "Search me, O God, and know my heart; test me and know my anxious thoughts" (verse 23).

LESSON #11: Lord, the longing of my heart is to know from You if there is anything in my life which is "offensive" to You (verse 24).

LESSON #12: Lord, "lead me in the way everlasting" (verse 24).

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What are some of the lessons we can learn from this particular study?

LESSON #1: David held nothing back in his "cry aloud to the Lord" (verse 1).

LESSON #2: Verbalizing our prayers sometimes helps us to keep our thoughts on track.

LESSON #3: "Our lives are shaped not as much by our experiences as by our expectations" (George Bernard Shaw).

LESSON #4: David was honest and transparent in prayer as he poured out his "complaints" and his "troubles" to the Lord (verse 2).

LESSON #5: There are going to be times in our Christian experience when our "spirit [will grow] faint within [us]" (verse 3).

- LESSON #6: There are three things that bring David a lot of joy in this Psalm: (1) "it is you who know my way"—<u>verse 3</u>; (2) "You are my refuge, my portion in the land of the living"—<u>verse 5</u>; and (3) "Set me free from my prison, that I may praise your name. Then the righteous will gather about me because of your goodness to me" (<u>verse 7</u>).
- LESSON #7: "The path of the righteous is like the first gleam of dawn, shining ever brighter till the full light of day" (Proverbs 4:18).
- LESSON #8: Lord, although David can see no one who is "concerned" for him, "no refuge," and "no one cares for [his] life," yet he has the promise we all have. You will never leave us nor forsake us (verse 4).
- LESSON #9: Thank you, Lord, that You are our "refuge" and that You are our "portion in the land of the living" (verses 4 & 5).
- LESSON #10: Lord, it is a joy to know that when we are in desperate need and the enemy is too strong, Your strength is made perfect in our weakness.
- LESSON #11: "Set me free from my prison, that I may praise your name" (verse 7).
