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Paul warns Timothy in a similar way in 1 Timothy chapter 4: But the Spirit explicitly is saying that in latter times some will fall away from the faith, paying attention to deceitful spirits and to teachings of demons, by the hypocritical preaching of liars, seared in their own

consciences with a red-hot branding iron."

In his second letter to Timothy, 2 Timothy chapter 3, he says, "But mark this, there will be terrible times in the last days. People will be lovers of themselves, lovers of money, boastful, proud, abusive, disobedient to their parents, ungrateful, unholy, without love, unforgiving, slanderous, without self control, brutal, not lovers of the good, treacherous, rash, conceited, lovers of pleasure rather than lovers of God, having a form of godliness, but denying its power, Have nothing to do with them. They are the kind who worm their way

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into homes and gain control over weak-willed women who are loaded down with sins and are swayed by all kinds of evil desires, always learning but never able to acknowledge the truth."

For there are many rebellious men, empty talkers and deceivers, especially those of the circumcision.

Back in our last study, the 9th verse said "Clinging to the trustworthy message which is in accordance with the teaching, in order that he may be able both to be exhorting in sound doctrine and to be refuting those who are contradicting." And now, the apostle here gives the reason for that admonition "to be clinging to the message," and why it is necessary to be refuting those who are contradicting.

The reason being "for there are many rebellious men, empty talkers

The apostle here is making reference to the Jewish teachers who were coming behind the teaching of the apostle Paul and trying to add legal requirements for the salvation of Gentiles. Titus has already had an encounter with this situation at the Jerusalem Council, and the council voted in favor of salvation by faith alone and Titus was the test case on that occasion.

These teachers are characterized in three ways:

They are rebellious men. Empty talkers Deceivers

The first thing that can be said about them is they are rebellious men

They were neither submissive to the teaching of God's word or to the ultimate decision of the Jerusalem Council, and so the ultimate decision of the Jerusalem Council, and so the apostle hat every right to call them rebellious. The apostle quotes from one of their own philosophers to verify the fact that others like themselves recognized that the people on the island of Crete were characterized by being liars, evil beasts and lazy gluttons.

To demonstrate the depths to which these people had fallen, Paul quotes a native of the island. The poet quoted is Epimenides, a 6th century B.C. resident of the island. Paul also quoted from a learned philosopher at Athens, and on other occasions demonstrated a great knowledge of the literary accomplishments of the ancients. Many ancient writers, Aristotle, Cicero, mention him as prophet and the apostle therefore cites him by this well-known description. Being a wellknown Cretan condemns his own people, the apostle cannot be charged with censoriousness for his exposures. That Cretans were notorious for untruthfulness is strikingly confirmed by the Greek language meaning 'to lie.' The accompanying containing a word 'cre+120 elements in their unenviable reputation give the measure of their 'Evil beasts' represents a maliciousness akin to the sensuousness. more savage animal creation, while 'slow bellies or idol gluttons' describes their uncontrolled greed. The inclusion of such a lashing criticism of the Cretan character in this letter to Titus would seem to rule out the idea that the letter was semi-official. The apostle is about to urge Titus to take a strong hand with the unruly element in the church and is first priming him on the well-known characteristics of the people with whom he is dealing. This principle has constant relevance for every minister of the gospel must, of necessity, be cognizant with the character of his people, however distasteful the facts may be."

Knowing that and actually experiencing it, Paul does not say to Timothy, Leave them alone. They are bad and all men know it. Go and convert them. There are few passages which so demonstrate the divine optimism of the Christian missionary and evangelist who refuses to regard any man as hopeless. The greater the evil, the greater the challenge. It is the Christian conviction that there is no sin which is too great for the grace of Jesus Christ to encounter and to conquer."

Paul has already made reference to "Titus, my true child in a common And now here in the 13th verse it is his hope that these Cretan Christians can become sound and healthy in their faith, and this would only be true as they are freeing themselves from the error of the false teachers who are pressing them at this time.

Not paying attention to Jewish myths and commandments of men who are turning themselves away from the truth.

The purpose behind Paul's command to Timothy to discipline them by rebuking them severely is seen positively in v.13 "in order that they may be sound in the faith, but negatively in v.14 so that they will "not be paying attention to Jewish myths and commandments of men who are turning themselves away from the truth."

Here is the key to why their lives are such a mess and there is such an absence of true godliness among them. They are turning themselves away from the truth.

Back in our first study, we noted together that in the process of godliness, a man comes to faith in Jesus Christ. He then comes to a knowledge of the truth, which does produce godliness in the personal life.

The problem in Crete was they were listening to teachers of error who were turning themselves away from the truth of the Word of God, and as a result, their personal lives were displaying it by an absence of true godliness.

These men of error were teaching Jewish myths and the commandments and traditions of men, rather than the exhortations, instructions, and commandments of God.

v.15

All things are pure, to those who are pure; but to those who are defiled and unbelieving nothing is pure, but both their mind and their conscience are defiled.

Kent points out "To unbelievers, however, nothing is clean because their sinful lives, thoughts and motives which are at cross purposes with God will infect even that which is intrinsically pure.

It was Jesus in the Sermon on the Mount who said, "Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God." "All things are pure to those who are pure.

Here the apostle points out that one of the things that happens when reason together, saith the Lord. Though your sins be as scarlet, they shall be as white as snow; though they be red like crimson, they shall be as wool." As a man is purified by the blood of Jesus Christ, then all things are pure to this person. Having the mind and the conscience purified and cleansed, then the new believer has a different perspective.

De 139 We and unbelieving; that is, without knowing Christ as Savior, nothing is pure.

Sex) becomes something which is dirty and defiled because it becomes something for selfish gratification. The love of money is the root of all evil because materialism becomes the dominant factor in the man's life who is not walking with God.

Personal relationships are defiled because of greed, resentment, bitterness, jealousy, envy, and strife.

The godly man sees the happenings of life from a positive perspective from the hand of a loving God, bringing about good in his life. The defiled man forms a critical spirit and becomes stubborn and resentful when difficulty comes into his life, believing that he has less than he deserves.

The reason nothing is pure to those who are defiled and unbelieving is given in the last statement of verse 15: "their mind and their conscience are defiled."

"As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he." The emphasis in the scripture is upon bringing every thought captive under the obedience of Christ, letting this mind be in us which was also in Christ.

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Philippians 4:8,9 "Finally, brothers, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable, if anything is excellent or praiseworthy, think about such things. Whatever you have learned or received or heard from me or seen in me, put it into practice and the God of peace will be with you."

Not only is the mind defiled, but the conscience also. The apostle says "Herein do I exercise myself to have always a conscience void of offense toward God and toward man."

These that he has been speaking in this section are confessing to know God. It is awfully easy to confess with one's lips that there is a knowledge of God, that he or she is a Christian. But when you look at their lives, you see a real absence of godliness. They are saying, "Yeah, I know God." "Yes, I know Christ." But by their deeds, when you examine the fruitage of their lives, you see 4 things described here in this 16th verse:

This is the message of James that "faith without works is dead."

Their personal lives are detestable; that is, vile, repulsive, ugly. And on top of all of this, they are disobedient to the truth of the Word of God.

Getz points out in his book A Profile for a Christian Lifestyle: "And what made this problem even worse, they had purposely mixed truth with error in order to deceive more people. Thus Paul wrote, 'They claimed to know God, but by their actions, they deny Him.' How could any person lower himself to the place where he used the name of God for purely selfish purposes. This these men did. And when this happened, Paul showed little mercy. This explains why he used certain words to describe them. They are

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aul when I he detestable, disobedient and unfit for doing anything good. words, a gentle approach could only serve to further their own selfish endeavors. There is only one way to reach men who deliberately lie, who destroy people's families without a twinge of conscience, and who rip people off in the name of God. They must be directly confronted with the Word of God by godly persons whose motives are pure and whose lifestyles exemplify the characteristics of Jesus approach and, even more so, he wanted the body of Christ in Crete

As far as true authentic godliness and good works flowing from a living faith in their lives, everything they do is disapproved.

When you hear these men speak, they are giving a message that they know God, but when you look at their personal lives, you see that they are denying Him. They are detestable. They are disobedient. And as far as every good work is concerned, they are disapproved. What a tragedy when we can see in something like this a perversion of godliness. Men, who with their lips speak one thing, and with their lives live something else.

CONCLUSION:

As we have discerned together how to recognize error from truth, the apostle has described for us these men who are speaking error are rebellious men, empty talkers and deceivers. They are upsetting whole families and teaching things which can make for personal financial benefit for themselves. They are like the Cretans who are liars, evil beasts, and lazy gluttons. those who are turning themselves away from the truth. result, turning themselves away from the source of true godliness. They are those who confess to know God, but by their deeds they are denying Him. By their deeds, they are detestable. And by their deeds, they are manifesting disobedience and there is no good work which is approved.

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What are some of the lessons that we learn out of this particular study?

- LESSON #1: Those who are teaching error use a lot of words but say little.
- LESSON #2 Those who have to speak often of financial matters in their ministry must be scrutinized with suspicion.
- LESSON #3: False godliness is the result of man's human effort.
 Whereas, true godliness is the result of God's work in our
 lives.
- LESSON #4 The decision to turn away from the truth produces the ugly lives in this passage.
- LESSON #5: The goal of every growing believer ought to be a pure mind and a clear conscience.
- LESSON #6: Watch the person who confesses to know God, but whose life cannot bear close scrutiny.
